Adler House Museum

- Baker Historic District, Baker City
- 10 a.m.-2 p.m. Friday through Monday, Memorial Day to Labor Day
- Adults: \$6 / Children: Free

The home of Baker City philanthropist Leo Adler has been restored to its 1889 state and covers life in the home as well as the story of Adler's magazine empire and the \$21 million fortune he left to Baker County.

Baker Heritage Center

- Downtown Baker City
- Open all year, hours seasonal
- Adults: \$6 / Seniors, Teens: \$5 / Children: Free

Exhibits on mining, timber and ranching industries, plus Chinese culture and the life of early settlers, all set in the city's 1920 natatorium, a 33,000-square-foot building that housed the city's indoor pool.

National Historic Oregon Trail Interpretive Center

- Near Baker City
- 9 a.m.-6 p.m., June-October
- Adults: \$8 / Seniors: \$4.50 / Children: Free

The center, operated by the Bureau of Land Management, offers year-round exhibits and seasonal workshops and performances, as well as visits to the remains of the Oregon Trail.



The Living Culture Village at Tamastlikt Cultural Institute in Mission is open in the summer months.

Tamastlikt Cultural Institute

- Mission (near Pendleton, on the Umatilla Indian Reservation)
- Monday-Saturday, 10 a.m.-5 p.m.
- Adults: \$10 / Seniors and Children: \$6 / Family of 4: \$25

This museum focuses on the 10,000-year history of the reservation's three tribes as well as the formation of the reservation itself. The Living Cultural Museum is open during the summer months and a regular rotation of exhibits are included in the price of admission.

Pendleton Round-Up and Happy Canyon Hall of Fame

- Pendleton
- Open Saturday 10-4
- Adults: \$5 / Seniors: \$4 / Children: \$2

The hall of fame celebrating the Round-Up and Happy Canyon was created in 1969 with 10 men and five horses inducted. Along with the hall of fame, exhibits span a century of history, with saddles, Indian regalia, photographs, firearms, trophies, wagons and more.

Union County Museum

- Union
- 10 a.m. to 4 p.m., Monday-Saturday, Mother's Day through mid-October.
- Adults: \$5 / Seniors: \$4 / Students: \$3

The museum covers geography, life and transportation for the state's pioneers and a timeline of cowboys in the West.

Heritage Station Museum

- Pendleton
- Tuesday-Saturday, 10 a.m. - 4 p.m.
- Adults: \$5 / Seniors: \$4 / Children: \$2 / Family: \$10

Housed in the 1909 train depot, the Umatilla County Historical Society museum features a number of revolving exhibits as well as permanent features, including an 1879 schoolhouse and a hand-hewn log cabin and a caboose.

Maxwell Railroad Museum

- Hermiston
- Saturdays by appointment

Commemorating the early days of railroad travel, two of this museum's most unique pieces are two rotary snowplows. The one built in 1949 is the only of its kind still in existence.

SAGE Center

- Boardman
- Daily
- Adults: \$5 / Students, Seniors: \$3

Sustainable agriculture and energy have given Eastern Oregon a foothold in the global market, and this interactive museum created by the Port of Morrow pays tribute to the resources and technology that make the county hum. Don't miss the hot air balloon simulator, or free cheese Saturdays.

Pacific Salmon Visitor Center

- Umatilla
- Daily, 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. (free)

The center is operated by the Army Corps of Engineers at McNary Dam and features interpretive displays on both wildlife and hydroelectricity, videos and a fish ladder with viewing area.

Rural Living Museum

- Heppner
- Tuesday-Saturday, March-October.
- Admission: \$3

Doubling as the Morrow County Museum, the exhibits give a glimpse of pioneer life, homesteading, and a chronicle of the rural Northwest. The collection follows the social, economic and technological development of Morrow County.

Northeast Oregon also includes a number of museums off this tour, including the Eastern Oregon Museum in Haines, The Sumpter Museum in Sumpter, the Frazier Farmstead Museum in Milton-Freewater, the Wallowa County Museum in Joseph, and the Wallowa Band Nez Perce Trail Interpretive Center in Wallowa.
