this season, as well as her first start. (Estacada) put the ball in play a lot, we just had a great defense behind her," Mac-Hi coach Nicole Christian said. "(Earls) had total faith in her teammates behind her today and pitched great.'

Copeland was the Pioneers catcher for the 2015 campaign, but jumped at the chance to be the No. 1 starter this season. She started against Twin Falls and pitched five innings of one-run ball allowing just four hits with two strikeouts.

Christian said both pitchers have her confident moving forward.

"They're really good pitchers who trust their defense behind them, which is a different mindset from last year where we were dependent on Colette's power," she said. "They're both multi-talented athletes that can play anywhere, too, which is nice as a coach.'

But as good as she was on the rubber, Copeland was a force at the plate for the Pioneers going 5-7 with 13 RBIs, two doubles, and two home runs — including a grand slam - over the two games. Copeland has thrived in the four games since moving to the No. 4 spot in the lineup with speedy players such Rachel Lyon, Shannon Carter, and Micha Fortune ahead of her. She is hitting .750 (9-12) with three home runs and a staggering 17 RBIs over that span.

"Having the heavy speed in front of her works really well," Christian said. "(Copeland's) the one you want at the plate in these situations and she's done great for us." Lyon and Carter were solid in

both games on Saturday, combining

to go 6-11 at the plate and score 12 runs, while Fortune went 2-3 with three runs scored. But as good as the top of the lineup has been, Christian said
