Robert M. Hoskins was born August 6, 1925, in Pendleton, Oregon. He was the second son of Fred Hoskins Sr. and Mary Alice Corrigan Hoskins.

The family moved to Rhea Creek the winter of 1925-26. He attended his first grade at the Liberty School, riding horseback with his brother Fred Jr. When a school bus became available he attended school in Ione. He excelled in all sports, was elected student body president and graduated in 1943.

In the spring of 1944 he was drafted and went to Fort Lewis and then to Little Rock, Arkansas. After boot camp he decided to join the paratroops, because they paid more, all of \$100. On his last training jump he was badly injured in the hips and back and spent 6 weeks in the hospital at Fort Benning, Georgia.

After the war he returned to the Rhea Creek ranch. He and Darlene Biddle were married Oct. 19, 1946. They made their first home with his parents on the Rhea Creek ranch. Next year they cut tamarack logs on Wilber

Mountain and hauled them home on an old International truck, getting a ticket for being over-length. They proceeded to build a cabin, taking several years, but it was paid for when they were done. The REA had come through and they were able to have electric appliances.

Robert wanted to run sheep like his dad had done, and after several years he had two small bands, moving back and forth from the home ranch to the summer range around Wilber Mountain. When the lamb price dropped to 15 and 17 cents, they turned to cattle and still owned the herd when he passed away.

They are the parents of two daughters, Anne Munkers and Mickie Madison. Their grandchildren are Jennifer Madison Wardlaw, Robert John Madison and Mazie Madison.

**Market sells two Scratch-it jackpot tickets in two months**

They say lightning never strikes the same place twice, but lottery sales at the Eastside Market in Hermiston prove that good luck sometimes does.

The market sold two winning Scratch-it jackpot tickets in two months, totaling \$125,000 in winnings for Hermiston residents.

The first ticket was in early March, when they

sold a \$25,000 jackpot on Jackpot Scratch-its, according to a news release by the Oregon Lottery. Then on Saturday, Cindy Storie stopped at the Eastside Market to get a Diet Coke and decided to purchase the \$10 Scratch-it that turned out to be worth \$100,000.

"So I get home and I am scratching it and realized I won, but I hadn't scratched off the prizes yet," Storie said in the news release. "When I started scratching I couldn't believe it. I thought I won \$100 and it was \$100,000!"

To say Storie and the clerk who sold her the ticket were excited would be an understatement. Eastside Market owner Joe Thompson said everyone was "hysterical" when they called him at home with the good news.

"Cindy is a regular customer to the market, so it was crazy to hear both of them hysterical," Thompson said. "It's a very good thing."

Thompson has run Eastside Market since 1985 and the business has been in his family since the 1970s. According to the Oregon Lottery, it was one of the

lottery's first retailers in the state.

Stores that sell a winning ticket get a 1 percent commission, and Thompson said for big wins he gives a portion as a bonus to staff and then puts the rest back into the business.

On Wednesday employees said there were already customers coming in who had heard about the jackpot through word of mouth and wanted to buy tickets from the lucky store.

Storie said she is still deciding what to do with her winnings.

"My sister is going on a cruise this summer and she wants me to go with her, I guess I could do that now," she said. "I am big believer in karma and doing good things, this really came back around."

The Oregon Lottery office said prize winners of more than \$50,000 should contact the office to schedule an appointment to claim their prize. Players should always sign the back of their tickets.

**Seven new members appointed to forests resource committee**

**Project proposals deadline extended to April 22**

Seven new members will join the Northeast Oregon Forests Resource Advisory Committee, tasked with recommending projects to improve or restore the Umatilla, Wallowa-Whitman and Malheur national forests.

NEOFAC now has a full 15 members, plus two extras, and will meet in June to consider proposals under the Secure Rural Schools Act, which directs federal forest payments to local counties. That meeting will be at the Grant County Regional Airport at a time and date to be announced.

A variety of organizations, including nonprofits and local governments, can submit projects to the NEOFAC for consideration. Proposals do not necessarily need to be on national forest land, but must show some kind of benefit to the national forests — such as restoring watersheds, maintaining roads or trails, thinning tree stands or controlling noxious weeds. The deadline for submission was April 1, but has since been extended to April 22.

Jeff Tomac, Whitman District Ranger on the Wallowa-Whitman National Forest, acts as a liaison between the committee and the Forest Service. He said NEOFAC makes recommendations to the three forest supervisors, who have final say on which proposals receive funding. Tomac said committee members can include schoolteachers, conservationists, tribal members, ranchers and more.

"We have a fairly balanced group from before," Tomac said. "These additional members will just add to the diversity of folks we have here on the (committee)."

Application forms for proposals can be found on the Forest Service website, or by contacting Ian Reid on the Umatilla National Forest at 541-427-5316; Arlene

Blumton on the Wallowa-Whitman National Forest at 541-962-8522; or Susan Garner on the Malheur National Forest at 541-575-3039. Projects must be started by Sept. 30, 2017 to qualify for funding.
