DEAR ABBY

Parents who preach respect don't practice it themselves

Dear Abby: I am a 17-year-old girl and a senior in high school. My parents and I (more my mom and I) have struggled with the topic of "respect" for a long time. We had a discussion about this earlier today and it led to arguing and tears.

She constantly says, "To earn respect, you must give it," and I agree 100 percent. The problem is, she doesn't believe that she and Dad should live by that — just me. She feels that no matter how upset or annoyed I might get by something rude she or Dad says, I don't have the right to talk back.

What upsets me is they talk rude to me all the time! How can you expect your kid not to do something when they do it as parents all the time?! Do parents have the right to talk rude if they want and expect their kids to be perfect little angels? Please help. — **Needs Respect**

Dear Needs Respect: Parents should model the behavior they want from their children. Sometimes it's difficult not to react and say something impulsive (rude), but that doesn't mean that parents — and teenagers — shouldn't make every effort to be polite.

A step in the right direction would be to say, "When you do that, it makes me feel ..." Try it, and you may get a better reaction from your mom and dad.

Dear Abby: My son is 8 and lost his dad a year ago. His dad was never very involved in his life, even though our son begged for his attention. His dad's sister, "Jillian," is a children's coach and very tough and hardcore. She has tried to have a relationship with my son, but he is pulling away from her and doesn't want to do anything with her.

When she asks to do something with him, he refuses. I have tried to prevent friction by telling her we already have plans. It finally came to a head when she accused me of trying to keep him from his dad's family. When I told her the truth, that her personality is too strong for my son, she replied that it's not a good enough reason.

Jillian is an alcoholic. She drinks no matter what time of day it is, so I'm OK with the idea that my son doesn't want to go anywhere with her. How do I handle this? — **Trying To Prevent Friction**

Dear Trying: When Jillian approaches you again, be as upfront with her about your own reason for not wanting your son to be with her as you were about his. You are right to worry about his safety because he would be at risk if he rode with a person who "drinks no matter what time of day it is." And don't let anyone talk you out of it.

Dear Abby: My husband and I have a disagreement that has been ongoing for a few years now. Sometimes I need to make a quick run into a store while he's driving. When I ask him to drop me at the front door, he insists on parking first and making me walk the distance — whatever that may be. I say it is thoughtful and courteous to be dropped off as close as possible, and he should park afterward and I'll walk to wherever he is when I come out.

Dear F.F.: Your husband may actually have a good reason for doing it. If you are with him when he parks the car, you will automatically know where to find him when you come out of the store.

DAYS GONE BY

100 Years Ago

April 23-24, 1916

On a charge of violating the dancing ordinance of Pendleton, Arthur J. Gibson, prominent contractor, was arrested Saturday night at the dance in Moose Hall given by the Sawyer Orchestra. He was arrested by Officer Frank Nash at the direction of Mayor J.A. Best. The arrest is said to have followed a personal clash between the mayor and Mr. Gibson between whom, according to reports, there has not been very friendly feeling during the past few months. According to a statement of the mayor this morning, he caused the arrest of Gibson because the latter practically dared him to do so. The dance ordinance prohibits indecent dancing and, for the guidance of the dancers, the managers of the dance had posted up signs stating that "ragging" would not be permitted and that in the one-step or walk-dance no more than eight steps may be taken without a pivot. Mayor Best charges that Gibson guided his partner entirely around the hall without turning, despite warnings given him.

A clash between the Circuit Court judge and the deputy district attorney has interrupted the trial docket in Umatilla County. District Attorney Dave Gallaher said he's having to juggle his case assignments to cope with a judge who bars the deputy prosecutor from trying jury cases in his court. The discord between Judge Robert Abrams and prosecutor Steve Fogelson has apparently been around for years, but it reared its head again Tuesday following the arraignment of a murder suspect. Larry Wilbur Myhre, the man accused of plotting to kidnap for ransom several wealthy Boise businessmen, was formally charged with two dozen counts of aggravated murder, kidnap, robbery and theft in the 1990 death of taxidermist Delbert Koll. District Court Judge Richard Courson, the presiding judge in Umatilla County, normally would have assigned Myhre's case to one of the county's two Circuit Court judges — Abrams or Jack Olsen. However, Abrams refused to take the case, saying he cannot preside fairly when Fogelson is prosecuting.

On April 23, 1616 (Old Style calendar), English poet and dramatist William Shakespeare died in Stratford-upon-Avon on what has traditionally been regarded as the 52nd anniversary of his birth in 1564.

In 1016, Aethelred II "The Unready," King of the English, died in London after 38 years on the throne.

In 1789, President-elect George Washington and his wife, Martha, moved into the first executive mansion, the Franklin House, in New York.

In 1791, the 15th president of the United States, James Buchanan, was born in Franklin County, Pennsylvania.

In 1910, former President Theodore Roosevelt delivered his "Man in the Arena" speech at the Sorbonne in Paris.

In 1935, Poland adopted a constitution which gave new powers to the presidency.
