Mize finished 1-2 in discus, and Paden Flerchinger also added high placings as the Grizzlies scored more than half their team points in shot put and discus alone.

Joseph was not to be outdone in the girls' competition, though, and won the team title with 82 points. Helix was fifth with 61.

Ontario won the boys' title with 106 and Mac-Hi was the top local team in seventh with 30.

Jackson's 110 feet, six inches throw to win discus was her personal best, and Mize was second with 108-7. Flerchinger was sixth with 88-5.

Jackson also placed second in shot put (33-4), Mize was third (33-2) and Flerchinger was seventh (30-6).

Mac-Hi senior Amber Wells won shot put with a personal-record 34-7.5, and also won javelin (113-10) and placed fourth in discus (102-6). Mac-Hi was seventh in team scoring with 45 points.

The Pioneers also had a pair of wins in boys throwing events with Landon Warner topping shot put and discus. The junior went 43-6.5 to win shot put and 134-9 in discus.

Helix's Sam Carlson was right behind him in both events and finished third in shot put (42-6) and second in discus (125-6). Mac-Hi's Donald Clark was third in discus (125-3).

No other locals won titles, but Pilot Rock's Abby Rigby, Rachel Willingham and Patrick Roe won silver, as did Echo's Kelsey Ranger.

Rigby was second by two tenths of a second in the girls' 100-meter dash (13.38), and Willingham was runner-up with a season-best time in the 300 hurdles (49.44). Roe ran a PR in the boys' 800 meters (2:12.62) but was still four seconds off the lead.

Ranger leapt a season-best 31-11 to take second in girls' triple jump.

PORTLAND — It was a big afternoon for Ione's Flynnns at the Portland Christian Invitational on Saturday.

The Cardinals' Jessie and Cord Flynn had the highest placings for Ione at the meet, and Jorge Aguilar was the only other Cardinals to land in the top five.

Jessie Flynn placed in four events, going for second in the 300-meter hurdles (51.79 seconds), third in the 100 hurdles (17.96) and discus (90-01), and fifth in long jump (14-11).

Cord Flynn was second in discus (114-11) and seventh in javelin (134-7), and Aguilar was fourth in shot put (38-7).

Conditions were far from perfect for Monday's round at Meadow Lakes Golf Course in Prineville, however, and the Buckaroos added 32 strokes to their prior round to finish in third place with a 326.

Summit won the team title with 309 and Bend was second with 318.

Pendleton coach Nels Nelson said he thought the team shot well considering the cool temperatures and windy gusts that made things precarious on a water-filled course.

Pendleton's best round was the 79 shot by Reilly Hegarty that tied him for seventh.

"We went from Big River (Golf Course in Umatilla) where we were playing in 75 degrees weather with no wind, to (Monday) playing in 60 degrees with 20 mile-per-hour winds and 30 mile-per-hour gusts," said Hegarty, comparing the Bucks' last two rounds.

Hegarty said the water was the biggest concern, though, and every hole had a hazard in play.

Summit's Cole Chrisman shot a 73 to take medalist and Summit's Jack Loberg was second with a 76.

Pendleton's team score was rounded out by Sam Kung (80), Nathan Som (83) and Brayden Pulver (84), and Jared Geier shot a 92.

Pendleton will be back in action today at the State Preview Tournament at Trysting Tree Golf Course in Corvallis.
