Naked woman in 'crisis' arrested after four incidents

Hermiston police were kept busy Monday responding to numerous incidents involving a woman Police Chief Jason Edmiston said in a news release was "clearly having a crisis of some kind."

after reports that she was walking down the road "acting crazy," but she refused offers of help.

At 9:30 a.m. Hermiston police took the woman to Good Shepherd Medical Center after responding to another call about her, this time that she was walking down Feedville Road naked.

And at 1:30 p.m. police received "numerous calls" from citizens who were alarmed after the woman walked away from the hospital and down the road with her bathrobe open.

contacted the woman again At that point she was taken to Umatilla County Jail in Pendleton on charges of disorderly conduct.

Edmiston said the chain of events was an example of a system that is "extremely frustrating" for law enforce-

"The new trend across the nation is to train officers to interact with people in crisis differently than before," he

wrote in a statement. "Inasmuch as that sounds great, the reality is people who are in crisis should be getting treatment from professionals not from line level police officers.

"In my opinion, the system failed yet again in this case as our agency was forced to arrest a person that clearly needs medical treatment of some kind."

A Portland native, Benedict was recruited to work for the Pendleton Fire Department in 1994 and has since made a life for himself in Eastern Oregon.

> In addition to his duties with the fire department, Benedict serves as chief to the volunteer Helix Rural Protection Fire District while his wife is a member of the Helix City Council.

His last day with the department will be May 31.

Pendleton Fire Chief Mike Ciraulo commended Benedict for his new job and said he was well-liked in the department.

Ciraulo said Remillard, former a Pendleton fire marshal and Umatilla County emergency manager, will cover fire marshal duties on an interim basis while the department searches for a full-time replacement.

While he's encouraging department personnel to apply for the position, Ciraulo said the city will cast a wide net in looking for the next fire marshal-assistant chief.
