Raptors tie series with overtime win

TORONTO — DeMarre Carroll scored 21 points, Jonas Valanciunas had 15 points and 12 rebounds, and the Toronto Raptors beat the Miami Heat 96-92 in overtime on Thursday night to even the Eastern Conference semifinals at one game apiece.

Valanciunas had 11 points and seven rebounds in the fourth quarter and overtime as the Raptors avoided losing consecutive games for the first time this postseason.

Toronto made just 42 percent of its shots compared to Miami's 49.4 percent, but the Raptors survived.

"There's a lot of different ways to win a game," Raptors coach Dwane Casey said. "Fortunately our guys found a way."

DeMar DeRozan scored 20 points, Kyle Lowry had 18 and Terrence Ross 10 for Toronto, which battled back late in the fourth quarter to force the second overtime of the series, then shut the Heat down to start it.

"I didn't think we did a good job at all executing (in overtime)," Dwyane Wade said. "I thought our offense was poor. In a sense, we feel like we gave one up."

Goran Dragic scored 20, and Wade and Joe Johnson each had 17 for the Heat. Hassan Whiteside had 13 points and 13 rebounds, while Luol Deng had 12 points.

Game 3 is Saturday in Miami. Dragic tied the game at 86-86 with a 3 with 10.5 seconds left in regulation, but the Heat went cold in overtime, missing their first five field goal attempts, including three misses by Johnson.

Miami's first basket of overtime was a driving dunk by Deng with 23 seconds left.

Hegarty, a senior, and Kung, an exchange student from Taiwan, have consistently been two of Pendleton's lowest scorers this season with Hegarty the unquestioned No. 1. But a great supporting cast that includes Som, junior Brayden Pulver and sophomore Jared Geier, has each proven capable of shooting rounds in the 70's this season, which is why the Bucks are hopeful for a regional title at Eagle Crest Resort.

"I think we've got a good team to do it, a pretty close group of guys, and I think we're definitely not done (improving)," said Hegarty.

There will be 15 teams standing in their way, and defending state and regional champion Summit tops the list.

The Bucks finished 15 strokes behind the Storm in an 18-hole tournament on the Ridge Course at Eagle Crest back on April 1.

"I think they had a good tournament and I think we had an average tournament," said Hegarty, who was individual medalist during that round with a two-under par 70. "I think we all want to see our scores go down three or four strokes and I think, with that, our best up against anybody else in the state's best is going to be a toss up."

Pendleton shot a program-record 294 at Big River Golf Course on April 12 that saw their highest individual score come in at 77, and overcoming the Storm will take a similar effort as Summit returns three

of last year's top-five regional placers led by defending champion junior Cole Chrisman. The good news for the Bucks, and the Hermiston Bulldogs, is that the top five teams will all advance to the state tournament.

Like Pendleton, Hermiston will be looking to extend a run of state appearances, but will face a tougher path. The Bulldogs go into today's round with just two golfers that have regional or state tournament experience, and shot 358 when they played the Ridge Course in early April.

Another round like that would seriously cripple Hermiston's chances of a team berth, but that's not the only avenue to state. The top 10 placers will also qualify, and junior Anders

Lind is coming off a 77 at the state preview tournament on April 27. Junior Jared Thacker is Hermiston's other golfer with postseason experience.

The last time Hermiston didn't send a team to state was 2010, and Pendleton has qualified as a team every year since 2008.

Whichever teams and golfers advance from the regional field, recent history suggests they'll stand a better than fair chance at bringing home state hardware. Last year District 2 swept the top three team placings and placed 13 individuals in the top 20.

The Pendleton and Hermiston girls' golf teams face a similarly tough regional field when they tee off for the first round in their state qualifier on Monday at Indian Creek Golf Course in Hood River.

Although the number of teams (16) is the same, only the top four placers will advance from the girls' field. Like the boys, the top 10 individuals will also qualify.

Pendleton was the best of four teams to take part in an 18-hole tournament at Indian Creek on April 6, and shot a 367 that served an important lesson on how to attack the tricky course.

Bucks junior Haley Greb won that round with a four-over par 76, followed closely by The Dalles junior Illiana Telles with a 77 and Pendleton senior Shelby Greb with an 80.

Both of the Greb sisters finished in the top six at regionals last season, and

are looking to get the most from one of their final rounds together as Buckaroos.

"This is a big season for us, especially me playing the last sport with her, and we want to make it a good one and finish strong," Haley said. "I think we can place pretty well at state this year."

"I don't think it adds any pressure or anything," Shelby said. "I think it's more of a memorable season. I think that Haley and I, and in other sports too, volleyball and basketball, were kind of like, 'OK this is the last time we're going to play with each other and be on the same team.' That's going to be something that we're going to look back on and say, 'Wow that was really fun and it was a good memory.'"

Pendleton was fourth at regionals last season behind Summit, Bend and Ridgeview, and was 40 strokes behind Summit in their most recent round at the state preview on April 28.

Hermiston also played in that tournament but didn't have any player shoot below 100.

District 2 produced four of the top five teams and 14 of the top 20 individuals at state in 2015 with the Bucks coming in fourth. Pendleton has qualified its full team for the state tournament each of the last three seasons while Hermiston last went as a team in 2014.
