



Highlight in Today's History

On May 21, 1927, Charles A. Lindbergh landed his Spirit of St. Louis monoplane near Paris, completing the first solo airplane flight across the Atlantic Ocean in 33 1/2

On this date:

In 1471, King Henry VI of England died in the Tower of London at age 49. In 1542, Spanish explorer

Hernando de Soto died while searching for gold along the Mississippi River. In 1881, Clara Barton

founded the American Red

Cross. In 1892, the opera "Pagliacci," by Ruggero Leoncavallo, premiered in

Milan, Italy. In 1924, in a case that drew much notoriety, 14-year-old Bobby Franks was murdered in a "thrill killing" carried out by University of Chicago students Nathan Leopold Jr. and Richard Loeb (Bobby's cousin).

In 1932, Amelia Earhart became the first woman to fly solo across the Atlantic Ocean as she landed in Northern Ireland, about 15 hours after leaving Newfoundland.

In 1941, a German U-boat sank the American merchant steamship SS Robin Moor in the South Atlantic after
