

Meeting to discuss Initiative Petition 28

HERMISTON — A presentation about Initiative Petition 28 is planned in Hermiston.

Alison Hart, executive director of the Oregon State Chamber of Commerce, will discuss the proposed tax that is likely heading to voters in November. The initiative proposes a \$5 billion tax on sales — the largest in the history of the state — that could increase everyday consumer items like food, gas, medicine, cable TV and even electricity, Hart said.

Although IP28 is a flawed, costly and damaging proposal for Oregon, Hart said, defeating it won't be easy




