# Wife questions care received at out-of-town walk-in clinic

Dear Abby: On a recent trip out of state, my husband became ill. The hotel we stayed in referred us to a nearby urgent care walk-in clinic.

The nurse took his blood pressure, which was very high. The "doctor" never took his temperature or mentioned the high blood pressure to us. He prescribed six drugs and we went on our way. My husband was happy; I was not.

When we returned home, I looked up the doctor's name on the internet. Actually, he was a physician's assistant, not a medical doctor. Abby, what should people do if they become sick while traveling? — Traveling Medical Emergency

**Dear T.M.E.**: You have asked an excellent question, one that may help many other people.

It is always wise when you travel to bring along a list of any medications you're taking and a copy of your medical records. Medical records are online these days and can be emailed to you upon request. A lot of health insurance companies offer a 24-hour service to call for a referral to a physician in whatever locale you happen to be.

Physician assistants are standard in many areas of the country as long as they are supervised by a physician — and in your husband's case, there should have been an M.D. on the premises. You, as the consumer, have a right to ask questions. It would not have been out of line to inquire about the certification of the person who was treating your husband, or to ask to see the supervising M.D.

If the medical emergency is dire, take no chances and call 911. If someone is really sick

able onsite.

#### 100 Years Ago From the East Oregonian July 8, 1916

H.W. Collins, well known local grain man and warehouse owner, has completed the purchase of the six Umatilla county warehouses owned by the Kerr-Gifford company and also makes the important announcement that he is actually preparing for the opening of a cleaning plant here to clean and grade wheat to be shipped to the east from the northwest this summer. Mr. Collins has purchased a large warehouse from F.E. Judd. It is located on East Webb street and has connection with both railroads. The machinery is now being installed and the cleaning plant will be in readiness for use in a short time. The plant will be owned and conducted personally by Mr. Collins. It is the intention to run crews both night and day and about 30 men will be employed during the season.

#### 50 Years Ago From the East Oregonian July 8, 1966

Pilot Rock's name appears on the jacket of a new record album. In the list of 11 singers of the album "Joy is Like the Rain" is Sister M. Judith Doherty of Pilot Rock. The Medical Mission Sisters of Philadelphia, Pa.,

started a year ago to sing among themselves a group of songs written by one of the sisters, Sister Miriam Therese Winter. Gradually, more and more people heard about them and began to ask for copies. As a result, 12 of the songs under the title "Joy is Like the Rain" were released by Avant Garde Records Inc. of New York this week.

#### 25 Years Ago From the East Oregonian July 8, 1991

Pamela Kuhn has known since she was 5 that she wanted to be the greatest singer in the world. She hasn't reached that goal yet. But she's getting closer. The Boardman graduate, who has been pursuing an opera career in Europe since 1978, scored a breakthrough this summer when she landed a starring role with the Milwaukie Opera. She knew it would take a long time to get established when she moved to London about 13 years ago. **On July 8, 1947**, an object crashed onto a ranch in Roswell, New Mexico, a local newspaper, the Roswell Daily Record, reported that the nearby U.S. Army Air Field had recovered a "flying saucer," but officials said it was actually a weather balloon. To this day, however, there are those who believe what fell to Earth was an alien spaceship that carried extra-terrestrial beings.

On this date:

In 1663, King Charles II of England granted a Royal Charter to Rhode Island.

In 1776, Col. John Nixon gave the first public reading of the Declaration of Independence, outside the State House (now Independence Hall) in Philadelphia.

In 1889, The Wall Street *Journal* was first published.

In 1891, Warren G. Harding married Florence Kling DeWolfe in Marion, Ohio.

In 1907, Florenz Ziegfeld staged his first "Follies," on the roof of the New York Theater.

1919. President In Woodrow Wilson received a tumultuous welcome in New York City after his return from the Versailles Peace Conference in France.

President In 1950, S. Truman named Harry Gen. Douglas MacArthur commander-in-chief United Nations forces in Korea. (Truman ended up sacking MacArthur insubordination nine months later.)

In 1965, Canadian Pacific Air Lines Flight 21, a Douglas DC-6B, crashed in British Columbia after the tail separated from the fuselage; all 52 people on board were killed in what authorities said was the result of an apparent bombing.

In 1975, President Gerald R. Ford announced he would seek a second term of office.
