

TRIALS: Rollins wins 100 hurdles

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a stunning halt in 100-meter semifinals, when she finished third — not good enough to make the eight-woman final.

“Tears are going to come,” she said. “Right now, I’m just in shock.”

Later, after the rain had stopped but the track was still slick, American record-holder Keni Harrison stumbled to a sixth-place finish and a spot on the couch next month. Brianna Rollins, the 2013 worlds gold medalist, won in 12.34 seconds, a comfortable .16 ahead of Kristi Castlin, who was considered a bigger threat four years ago at trials.

Harrison was supposed to be the woman to beat this year.

“It happened so fast,” she said, clearly holding back tears. “I’ll have to watch film. It’s unfortunate, because my season was going so well. But this stuff happens.”

It also happened to Shamier Little. The worlds silver medalist in 400-meter hurdles didn’t make it out of her semifinal heat.

Allyson Felix took to the track well before the rain hit, and coasted through her 200-meter qualifying heat in 22.93 seconds. It was her first race in nearly a year at her favorite distance. She said “nothing’s really changed” with her aching right ankle, despite four days of rest.

“Just trying to see how it does on the curve, and all that,” she said, as she moved ahead in her quest for the 200-400 double at the Rio Games.

Shortly after Felix’s race, the sky opened, and everybody’s outlook changed. The discus and pole vault competitions were delayed. The 100-meter hurdle semifinals turned into even more of an adventure than usual.

“I couldn’t see through my race,” said Nia Ali, who got safely through the

semifinal, then finished third in the final, too, to make the Olympics.

Suhr, whose gold medal in London came in a windy rainstorm, only needed one jump to qualify for the final.

“I’m thankful to make it, because you never take it for granted,” she said.

Also waiting out the rain was Tavis Bailey, who finished second in discus finals — one of the most competitive contests on the card.

“When raindrops are hitting the discus in your hand, that will get to you,” said Bailey, who finished behind Mason Finley.

Not so fortunate was defending national champion Jared Schuurmans, who finished fifth.

Others with decent chances who didn’t make the team included high jumpers Jesse Williams, the 2011 world champion, and Randall Cunningham, who was hoping to join his sister, Vashti, on the trip to Brazil.

“When you landed on the

mat, you landed in puddles,” said Cunningham, who does the bulk of his training in bone-dry Las Vegas. “Your whole body was soaked.”

Such is life in track and field — and everything is amplified in the no-excuses world of U.S. Olympic qualifying, where the top three finishers make it and no exceptions are made for injuries, past performances — or weather.

Nobody felt worse than Harper-Nelson, who burst onto the scene eight years ago at the Bird’s Nest in Beijing, crossing the line first after her more-ballyhooed teammate, Lolo Jones, tripped on the second-to-last barrier. That day, Harper-Nelson crossed the line and could be seen mouthing the words “What? What?”

She was every bit as dumbfounded by this finish.

“Complete disbelief,” she called it. “I’ve never been in a position where someone is pulling away and I wasn’t able to react.”

HURDLES WIN: Rollins stepped ever so slightly into an adjacent lane late in the 100-meter hurdles race but didn’t impede fourth-place finisher Queen Harrison, so there was no protest, and no change in the results.

SPRINT FAREWELL: Lost in the buzz over the high-schoolers making the 200-meter final was the fact that three longtime mainstays of the U.S. sprint team — Mike Rodgers, Wallace Spearmon and Walter Dix — all failed to advance. On the women’s side, Jenna Prandini had the best 200 time, at 22.72 seconds.

JAGR MASTERY: Evan Jager won the men’s steeplechase in 8:22.48. He’ll be joined in Rio by Hillary Bor and Donn Cabral.

ARIES ADVANCES: Defending Olympic champion Aries Merritt, less than a year removed from a kidney transplant, made it through his qualifying heat in 110-meter hurdles. Also making it were 2008 bronze

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“I had no idea it would turn out like this,” he said. “My dad tried to get me to enlist when I was younger and I resisted. Then after I enlisted, I thought there was no way in heck I’d go into the Marine Corps, but I did. Then after graduating I was headed toward (submarines) and then I was flying. I don’t think I could have every laid out a five-year plan that would have ever been close to accurate.”

The induction was also a family affair for Moore as his half-brother Kelly Dietz who anchored the Buckaroos as an offensive line from his center position from 1978-1981 was also inducted Friday. He earned first team Inter-Mountain Conference honors. Legendary coach Don Requa once called Dietz the best center he’s ever coached, though Dietz says Requa never said it directly to him.

“Maybe that was just a lapse in judgement for him,”

Dietz joked. “But it’s really nice he said that.”

Dietz said he’s been able to keep many memories of his playing days alive as he stayed and raised a family in Pendleton.

“The teammates, keeping the friends from school and getting to play for some of the coaches,” Dietz recalled, “and you look back on those guys and getting to know some of the coaches after the fact as people and they’re all just great guys.”

He has also given back to the Buckaroo program by volunteering with the youth football program for many years as well as calling Buckaroo games from the broadcast booth on KUMA and KTIK as a color commentator for many years.

Also in attendance was Hall of Famer Tim Temple as his family was being inducted for their many contributions spread out over an 85-year span. Five Temple’s already in the Hall of Fame before Friday’s induction with Tim in 2005, Mark in 2008, Kelly in

2010, Mike in 2011 and Mark in 2014. But several others left their marks on Pendleton football such as Earnest on the first-ever team in 1899, followed by Lee (1918-1920), David (1922-1924), Mack (1951-1953), Joe (1952-1954), Bob (1954-1955), Greg (1971-1973) and Patrick.

“It’s just fantastic, it’s a recognition that probably we don’t deserve but it’s wonderful to get it,” Tim Temple said. “I’m glad to see us all finally in.”

To wrap up the evening, the 1965-1966 Buckaroos became the 12th team to be enshrined since the Hall’s inception in 2004. That team finished the season with a 10-1 record and extended their IMC win streak to 43 wins that year. Their lone blemish being a loss to Reynolds in the state semifinals in front of a crowd of 5,000 at the Round-Up.

A silent auction was also held in coordination with the banquet and induction ceremonies on Friday, serving as a fundraiser for

the Linebacker Club’s annual scholarships that are given out to two senior football players. Items included MLB player autographed baseballs and golf packages, as well as tickets to Oregon Ducks, Portland Trail Blazers, and Oregon State Beavers football games.

Kai Quinn was awarded the \$10,000 Don Requa scholarship while Jacob Banks took home the \$4,000 Alex Stuvland Scholarship.

“I was the first recipient when it was just \$250,” Moore said, “and now ... two scholarships at \$14,000 total it’s just amazing at how far this has come.”

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teams. Early renditions also featured diving.

Probably the biggest key to the Open’s continued success is the pool itself. Opened in 1963, Pendleton’s facility remains one of the best around.

“We have one of the best facilities that we travel to,” said PSA head coach Tony Nelson. “We have people from Salem, all the way from the Seattle area, Boise — people travel (to swim here). We have a couple people from Bend, a lot of people.”

“We actually, next year, were awarded Champs, the championship meet, which is a really big deal. We’ve never had that here.”

The added competition, while welcome, also means Pendleton has no hope of claiming the team title in it’s 50th Open.

“Our main concern right now, because we are a small club, we can’t battle some of the (bigger teams),” Nelson said of a PSA team that has 50 swimmers entered in the Open. “Like Tri-City has 80 swimmers, we can’t compete with that numbers-wise. So the main thing that we’re doing is to try to qualify these kids for the next level of meets.”

Spokane and Tri-City were battling it out atop the leaderboard after 10 events with Spokane holding a slim 230-227 lead. Multnomah was a distant third with 113 and Pendleton was tied for 10th with 14.

The highest placer from Friday’s events for PSA was Cahill Robinson in fifth with a time of 2 minutes, 58.30 seconds in the 11-12-year-old boys’ 200-meter individual medley.

The girls’ highest placing on Friday came from Landry Huth in ninth (5:43.44) in the 15 and over 400 freestyle.

“She dropped 17 seconds (from her personal best), which is a lot in the 400,” Nelson said. “We’re hoping to get one- and two-second drops. We’re getting five-, 10-second drops.

“A lot of kids, even though they’re dropping time, there’s still room to go. So that’s nice.”

Events resume this morning and will continue through Sunday with added age groups for the youngest competitors.
