### A WEEK AT THE COUNTY FAIR

## For Olivia and Blue, it's show time

A county fair conformation is a nerve wracking ordeal for youth showing their animals. During a conformation a judge assesses each animal and ranks the animals. The top placing animals will be the first to go up for sale at the auction, followed by the bottom placing animals. At this year's fair cows, pigs and goats will all be auctioned before sheep, meaning a better placement during sheep conformation will hopefully mean a better chance at whatever money is left in the generous pockets of livestock buyers during the fair sale.

Olivia Warner was nervous heading into confirmation with Blue, her lamb. The sheep are separated into classes by weight; Blue was in the second class. After watching the first class of sheep endure conformation, Blue and Olivia

The judge scrutinized each lamb and lined them up in order of rank. Olivia and Blue were in the bottom half and she was clearly disappointed.

Her mom, Monica, said, "We're pretty disappointed. We're obviously more fond of our lamb than the judge was." She said Olivia, a perfectionist, was taking it fairly hard, but they would look forward to showmanship the following day.

The show barn at the fairgrounds was packed Friday morning with youth from 4-H and FFA, their respective lambs, and their friends and families. The fans were already on in an attempt to battle the simmering August heat. Blue had been sponge-bathed with baby wipes and he

and Olivia shared an occasional nervous snuggle. After more than two hours of waiting, Olivia and Blue were up.

"Just have fun out there today," Monica said. "And smile. The judge should be able to see what color of bands are on your braces."

The showmanship portion of the fair is an opportunity for the showman and lamb to exhibit how well they work together. The judge assesses their interactions to determine how much work the youth has put in with their animal. The judge is looking for such things as positioning of the lamb's feet, the lamb's responsiveness to its handler, and an overall awareness of what's happening, particularly where the judge is and what he or she is asking the pair to do.

Olivia's showmanship does not go without incident. At one point a fellow FFA member loses control of their lamb and it takes several minutes before the lamb is settled back in. Then, toward the end, Olivia practically has to wrestle another lamb to get it in line. At the end, Olivia and Blue are no longer at the bottom of the group, but they're not at the top either. Another disappointment for Olivia.

Monica expressed slight frustration. She said that just because the youth in FFA are older, sometimes the judges assume they've been showing for several years. But for Olivia and many of her friends, this is only their first or second year showing an animal. "I wish there was like a novice class or something for them," she said.

The bright spot is the pair have another day together before the auction.

### **Mayor-elect gathers** a committee to look at city priorities
