Earned 33 medals in the swimming pool, 12 in gymnastics alone

RIO DE JANEIRO — The medal race at the Rio Olympics will likely remain close going into the final weekend.

For second place, that is. The U.S. — which has left the last five Summer Games with more medals than any other country — is about to make it six in a row, and the Americans seem like they'll do so emphatically. With a handful of events left Tuesday night, the U.S. had 83 medals, 33 more than Britain and 34 more than China.

Take away the games that dealt with boycotts in 1980 and 1984, and the Americans are on pace for the biggest medal-count romp since outdistancing Sweden by 40 medals at the 1948 London Games. Incidentally, the all-time medal-count-margin record is way out of reach, that being the U.S. win by 220 medals at the St. Louis Games of 1904.

'We are the United States. We come here with an enormous presence and a lot of advantage and privilege," swimming gold medalist Anthony Ervin said after he prevailed in Rio de Janeiro, part of a huge pool medal haul for the Americans. "Our staff is unbelievable. The amount of people that help us ... I don't think the other teams are necessarily getting that. It starts there.'

Police: No evidence yet in Lochte robbery probe

Rio police say swimmers couldn't provide enough key details

RIO DE JANEIRO — Police investigating reports that American swimmer Ryan Lochte and three of his teammates were robbed at gunpoint in a taxi so far have found no evidence supporting the account, and say the swimmers were unable to provide key details in police interviews.

A police official with knowledge of the investigation told The Associated

Press that police cannot find their taxi driver or witnesses. The official spoke on condition of anonymity because the investigation is ongoing.

Lochte's attorney, Jeff Ostrow, said there was no question the robbery happened and that Lochte had 24-hour security hired after the incident. He hasn't been leaving his hotel room

"This happened the way he described it," Ostrow

According to Lochte and the United States Olympic Committee, the swimmers were returning to the athletes' village by taxi after a night out at the French Olympic team's hospitality

house in the Rodrigo de Freitas area in the upscale south zone of the city. The outing was several hours after Olympic swimming ended Saturday night at the Rio Games.

Traveling with Lochte were Gunnar Bentz, Jack Conger and Jimmy Feigen. Lochte swam in two events at the Rio Games, winning gold in the 4x200-meter freestyle relay. He is a 12-time Olympic medalist.

The group did not call police, authorities said, and officers began investigating once they saw media reports in which Lochte's mother spoke about the robbery. Police interviewed Lochte and one other swimmer,

who said they had been intoxicated and could not remember what type and color of taxi they rode in or where the robbery happened, the police official said. The swimmers also could not say what time the events occurred, or when they left the French House.

The incident got attention in part because of fears around street crime at the games. Athletes and visitors have been told to use caution around the Olympics. Street crime was a major concern of Olympic organizers, and Brazil deployed 85,000 soldiers and police, twice as many as Britain used during the 2012 London Olympics.

ANAHEIM, Cliff Pennington hit a go-ahead triple in the

streak. With two outs in the eighth, Jefry Marte turned on a 97 mph fastball from Arquimedes Caminero (2-3) and it drove into the stands to tie it 6-6. Jett Bandy kept the inning alive with a single, and Pennington sent him home with just his second

triple since 2014. Fernando Salas pitched a scoreless ninth for his third save, and Brett Oberholtzer (3-2) earned the win with a scoreless eighth.

The Mariners went ahead in the seventh when reliever J.C. Ramirez threw two wild pitches and overthrew first base on a routine groundout.

An error by Pennington put Robinson Cano on base and Ramirez then walked Nelson Cruz. With Kyle Seager batting, Ramirez threw his wild pitches, allowing Cano

to come home and tie the game and Cruz to reach third. Cruz scored when Ramirez threw Mike Zunino's grounder past Marte at first base.

Oregon WR takes fifth in Rio

RIO DE JANEIRO — Oregon Ducks wide receiver Devon Allen finished just off the medal stand in his lone Olympic event, finishing in fifth place of the men's 110-meter hurdles on

Tuesday evening. Jamaica's Omar McLeod took the gold medal in the event with a time of 13.05 seconds, while Spain's Orlando Ortega earned silver (13.17) and France's Dimitri Bascou (13.24) took bronze. Allen crossed the line at 13.31 seconds.

The Oregon junior squeezed into the finals after finishing in third place of his semifinal group earlier

Tuesday with a time of 13.36 seconds. Allen will now re-join the Ducks after a few days off but he hopes to be ready for the season opener on Sept. 3 against UC Davis.

"I'll probably be the best-shaped athlete on the field right now," Allen told the AP Tuesday. "We could squash that team, and I say that with all the respect in the world, but they outplayed us in every way. It's a terrible feeling."

 Kerri Walsh Jennings United States beach volleyball player and her teammated April Ross fell to a Brazilian duo in the semifinals on Tuesday evening, marking the first time Walsh Jennings had ever lost a match in Olympic play. Walsh Jennings, who was a three-time gold medalist coming into Rio, and Ross

will now play for bronze today.
