With his wife and children at his side, Raphael Royal Raymond Jr. passed away peacefully on August 31, 2016, at his home in Helix, Ore.

Royal was born to Gladys Snyder Raymond and Raphael Royal Raymond Sr. on Feb. 15, 1928, in Pendleton, Ore. Royal and his sister, Barbara Pinkerton, attended school in Helix where he was an honor student and standout athlete. He was active in music and traveled the state competing in tenor soloist contests.

He served in the U.S. Navy before attending Oregon State University, where he studied agriculture. He was a member of SAE and sang in the male chorus. It was here that he met Wilma Bowman, who in 1950 became his wife.

Wilma and Royal moved to the Raymond Ranch in Helix, where they remained for their entire 66 years of marriage. They had three children: Jennifer, Rebecca and Raphael Tony.

Royal was a member of the Masonic Lodge, Elks Club, Rotary, Pendleton Country Club and Juniper Canyon Country Club. He

served on the Helix Cemetery Board, Helix School Board, PGG Board, Umatilla County Cattleman’s Association and the Pendleton Round-Up Board.

Royal’s rugged cowboy persona began to fade as he aged, morphing into one of a proud grandparent. His biggest smiles were no longer on horseback, but in the bleachers. In his final years, his hands were used for picking up his 13 great-grandkids and placing them on his lap, not the hay bales that they had become accustomed to.

Royal is survived by his wife, Wilma Raymond; his son, Raphael Tony Raymond; his daughters, Rebecca Evans (Monte) and Jennifer Davis (Bill); his seven grandchildren (spouses); and 13 great-grandchildren.

He was loved and respected by many, and will be greatly missed by all who knew him.

A service will be held at the Vert Auditorium Tuesday, September 20, 2016, at 2 p.m. with a reception to follow at the Roy Raley Room on the Pendleton Round-Up Grounds.

- Elementary age students (75-150 words): What is your favorite thing to do in Oregon’s great outdoors? Describe a fun memory of spending time outdoors in Oregon.
- Middle school (100-200 words): Oregon is a great place to play outdoors, including camping, rafting, skiing, hiking, boating, surfing or just taking a walk. If you had a friend coming to visit you in Oregon who has never been here before,

where would you take them for a fun outdoor activity and what would you do?

- High school (150-250 words): What recommendations do you have for Oregon’s leaders about how to improve people’s access to outdoor recreation? Why is outdoor recreation an important part of Oregon’s identity?

The winning authors will be invited to the Oregon State Capitol for the Blue Book release celebration in early 2017.
