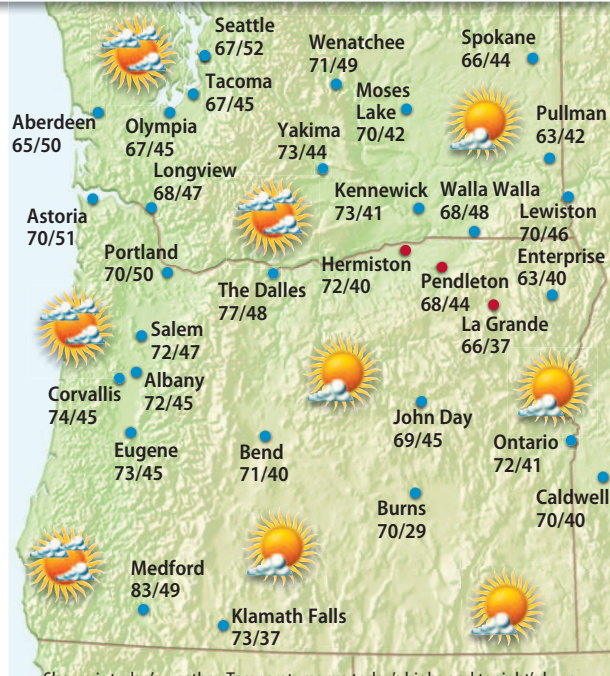

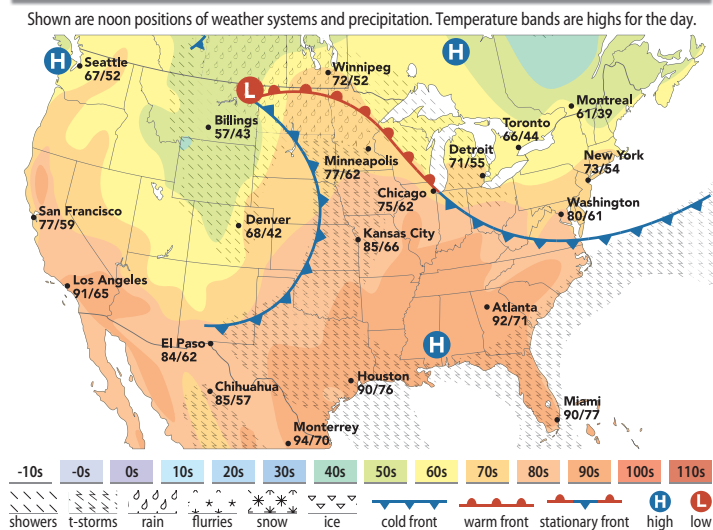

**Application filed to tear down Klamath dams**

SACRAMENTO, Calif. (AP) — The utility that owns four hydroelectric dams on the Klamath River in Oregon and California is beginning the formal process to tear them down.

PacifiCorp petitioned the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission on Friday to transfer ownership of the dams to a new nonprofit, which separately requested permission to decommission them.

The regulatory filings are the result of a landmark agreement earlier this year to allow salmon to return to hundreds of miles of the Klamath River in what federal officials call one of the largest river restoration projects in U.S. history.

The agreement also protects farmers and ranchers from rising power and water prices as various interests work to end long-running water wars in the drought-stricken Klamath basin.

**Oregon Democrats plan to take on 'flexible scheduling'**

PORTLAND (AP) — Oregon's Democratic lawmakers say they will be tackling a new workplace issue next year: a practice they're calling "flexible scheduling."

"It's going to be a big deal," said Sen. Michael Dembrow, a Portland Democrat who took up the issue Thursday, the second day of Capitol hearings meant to shape next year's agenda.

Dembrow says he plans to introduce legislation in 2017 that would require some employers to give

workers early notice of scheduling changes, *The Oregonian* reported.

It's not clear yet which companies would be covered by the proposal, but it would likely be similar to laws in Seattle and San Francisco. Those cities require companies with 500 or more employees to provide two weeks' notice of scheduling changes. In Seattle, employers must also provide compensation.

Getting buy-in from businesses might take some work, however. When lawmakers tried to hold a work group on the idea earlier this year, every business interest walked away at the first meeting.

The Oregon Farm Bureau, Oregon Trucking Association, Associated Oregon Industries, Northwest Grocery Association and Portland Business Alliance all signed a June 1 letter withdrawing from the group.

**Portland changes 600 restrooms to gender-neutral**

PORTLAND (AP) — About 600 city bathrooms will become "all-user" on Friday with signs designating female and male replaced with signs that show a toilet.

*The Oregonian* reports the new signs show what's behind the door and not who should be using the facility, according to city officials.

Portland City Commissioner Nick Fish proposed the change in December 2015 after he says people from across Portland asked for it.

The new signs will make the restrooms accessible to parents with young children, people with personal attendants and transgender people.

**Hansell proposes voluntary 'REAL ID' option**

SALEM — A proposal by an Oregon lawmaker would give Oregonians a voluntary path to upgrading their driver's license to national standards.

Oregonians could be barred from boarding commercial domestic flights using their state driver's license in 2018, unless lawmakers take action next session to comply with a federal mandate for more stringent identification criteria.

Sen. Bill Hansell, R-Athena, said he plans to submit legislation for next session that would allow individual Oregonians to choose whether to comply with the federal REAL ID law.

"If you don't want it for whatever reason, if you think it's an intrusion into your privacy, if you feel it is an intrusion of the federal government into your personal affairs, you don't have to do it," Hansell said.

The state Legislature passed a law in

2009 that prohibits state officials from spending money to comply with the federal law unless the federal government reimburses the state for the cost. Lawmakers also had privacy concerns about some of the federal requirements. Oregon is one of 27 states that don't comply with the federal standards.

Complying with REAL ID law would cost the state about \$2 million initially and about \$1 million annually to maintain, said Tom McClellan, administrator for the Oregon Department of Motor Vehicles.

The state already has received three extensions for complying with the law.

The last extension expires Oct. 10.

"Oregon is unlikely to secure an additional extension without immediately assuring the federal government that Oregon will attempt action during the next legislative session — namely, take steps to remove barriers to and make progress toward REAL ID compliance," McClellan wrote in a memo to lawmakers.

If the state is denied another extension, Oregonians will no longer be able to use their state driver's license to enter nuclear facilities, military bases and certain other federal facilities. The federal government's schedule for phasing in the law sets January 2018 as the deadline for having a REAL ID to board commercial domestic flights. Travelers will then have to use a passport or other federally approved form of ID to board commercial domestic flights.

**Judge threatens to hold Bundy lawyer in contempt**

PORTLAND (AP) — U.S. District Judge Anna Brown warned Ammon Bundy's lawyer that she will hold him in contempt of court if he keeps trying to bring up Robert "LaVoy" Finicum's death in front of jurors.

Police fatally shot the occupation spokesman Jan. 26 during a traffic stop north of the Malheur National Wildlife Refuge. The judge has repeatedly said this trial is about whether Bundy and his co-defendants engaged in a conspiracy during last winter's armed occupation of the refuge.

The judge told Bundy lawyer Marcus Mumford on Thursday that she will fine him \$1,000 each time he raises the Finicum issue while questioning witnesses.

"I have ruled on this issue and it appears to me you disregard it," Brown told him while jurors were away.

"Do you understand what I'm saying ... yes or no?" the judge asked.

"I don't understand. Your honor says I'm asking improper questions?" Mumford said.

The judge reminded Mumford that he had just tried to question a rancher whose property is adjacent to the refuge about the Finicum shooting.

"You are not to do that," Brown said.

"You're telling me I'm allowed to inquire about the shooting, but not the circumstances of the shooting?" Mumford asked.

Brown reminded Mumford that he can't

mention anything about the Finicum shooting, beyond that it occurred and the date.

"I can understand the words," Mumford said.

"I hope you can comply," the judge replied.

The trial resumes

Monday after a three-day weekend.

The government plans to conclude its case by Tuesday afternoon. Defense lawyers are expected to present their side starting on Wednesday.
