Good Shepherd announces improvements in patient safety

Good Shepherd Health Care System in Hermiston is reporting significant improvements to their patient safety outcomes after joining the Partnership for Patients effort.

The nationwide initiative launched in 2011 aims at reducing the number of "hospital-acquired conditions" by 40 percent and the number of readmissions by 20 percent.

At Good Shepherd, patient safety improvements include no central line-associated blood stream infections, no early elective deliveries of babies before 39 weeks when not medically necessary, no post-operative pulmonary embolisms or deep vein thrombosis events, a reduction in patient falls and a reduction in patients who acquire *Clostridium difficile* (*C. diff*) in the hospital.

Nationwide, Partnership for Patients estimates that 2.1

million infections were avoided, 87,000 fewer patients died and approximately \$20 billion in health care costs was saved between 2010-2014 as a result of concentrated efforts to reduce hospital-acquired illnesses and injuries.

The program is a public-private partnership between hospitals and the Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services under the Department of Health and Human Services.

Theresa Brock, GSHCS Patient Care Executive, said in a statement that Good Shepherd joined the Partnership for Patients initiative because collaboration among hospitals could yield "extraordinary improvements" in patient safety.

"We are extremely proud of our progress toward reducing harm to patients and preventing readmissions, and we will continue to cultivate a culture of safety on behalf of those who come to us for care," she said.

Nobel Prize boosts Colombian leader's pursuit of peace

BOGOTA, Colombia (AP) — By winning the Nobel Peace Prize, President Juan Manuel Santos got a big boost Friday in his efforts to save an agreement seeking to end Colombia's half-century conflict.

The prize, announced by the Norwegian Nobel Committee, puts pressure on both conservative critics and leftist rebels to find a way forward after the shocking defeat of the accord in an Oct. 2 referendum.

Santos dedicated the prize to his fellow Colombians, especially the victims of the bloody conflict, saying it would redouble his commitment to end hostilities that left 220,000 dead and almost 8 million displaced.

"I invite everyone to bring together our strength, our minds and our hearts in this great national endeavor so that we can win the most important prize of all: peace in Colombia," Santos said alongside his wife in his first public appearance after being notified he had won in a pre-dawn phone call from their son.
