100 Years Ago

The first piano ever received in Pendleton is today installed in the club room of the new county library. The piano, a Weber that still retains the original liquid tone, was brought into Pendleton by mule team in 1878 from Umatilla, to which town it had been shipped by boat. Its arrival in Pendleton was witnessed by a large crowd and was considered quite an event. Another piano received at the same time was later burned in the fire than destroyed the Christian Church.

Warren R. Young, son of Mr. and Mrs. John F. Young, Helix, has been named a Peace Corps volunteer after completing 10 weeks of training at Utah State University in Logan and six weeks of field training at Bolivia. The new volunteers, including Young, will expand Peace Corps work in Bolivia in rural agriculture extension on Oct. 29. They

are working with Bolivian farm and home advisers in improving methods in farming and home economics and carrying on programs with 4-S youth clubs, which are equivalent to U.S. 4-H clubs. The new arrivals will work mainly with in the departments (states) of Cochabamba, Santa Cruz and La Paz.

25 Years Ago

A woman promoting the idea of changing Umatilla's name to Umatilla Landing said she is finding enough interest to place it on the ballot. Peggy Gilliam, chairman of a local group planning for the 1992 Columbia River celebration, said 120 residents have been informally polled and only two disagreed with the idea outright. Gilliam said about 120 signatures, representing 15 percent of the people who voted in the last election, will be required to approve the petition for the ballot. About 100 people are waiting to sign the petition, she said. Gilliam said she feels the original name has the "emotional appeal" of historical ties to the past.

THIS DAY IN HISTORY

Today is the 293rd day of 2016. There are 73 days left in the year.

Today's Highlight in History:

On Oct. 19, 1216, John, King of England, died, more than a year after affixing his royal seal to Magna Carta ("The Great Charter").

On this date:
In 1765, the Stamp Act Congress, meeting in New York, adopted a declaration of rights and liberties which the British Parliament ignored.

In 1781, British troops under Gen. Lord Cornwallis surrendered at Yorktown, Virginia, as the American Revolution neared its end.

In 1789, John Jay was sworn in as the first Chief Justice of the United States.

In 1864, Confederate Lt. Gen. Jubal A. Early's soldiers attacked Union forces at Cedar Creek, Virginia; the Union troops were able to rally and defeat the Confederates.

In 1914, the U.S. Post Office began delivering mail with government-owned cars, as opposed to using contracted vehicles. The First Battle of Ypres began during World War I.

In 1936, H.R. Ekins of the

New York World-Telegram beat out Dorothy Kilgallen of the *New York Journal* and Leo Kieran of *The New York Times* in a round-the-world race on commercial flights that lasted 18 1/2 days.

In 1944, the U.S. Navy began accepting black women into WAVES (Women Accepted for Volunteer Emergency Service). The play "I Remember Mama" by John Van Druten opened at the Music Box Theater on Broadway.

In 1951, President Harry S. Truman signed an act formally ending the state of war with Germany.

In 1960, the United States began a limited embargo against Cuba covering all commodities except medical supplies and certain food products.

In 1977, the supersonic Concorde made its first landing in New York City.

In 1987, the stock market crashed as the Dow Jones Industrial Average plunged 508 points, or 22.6 percent in value, to close at 1,738.74.

In 1994, 22 people were killed as a terrorist bomb shattered a bus in the heart of Tel Aviv's shopping district.

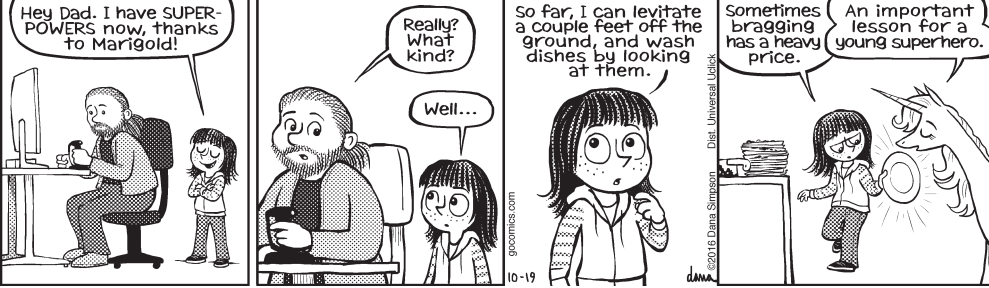
