Blazers stay true to process for 2016-17

PORTLAND — No longer the NBA’s surprising over-achievers, Damian Lillard says the Trail Blazers need to stay true to the process.

Portland went 44-38 last season despite losing four starters to free agency the previous summer. The team got the fifth seed in the Western Conference and played past the injury-depleted Los Angeles Clippers into the second round of the playoffs.

With greater expectations, the Blazers embark on this season hoping to build on the last.

“It’s something we’ll have to continue to push ourselves to do, but I think we just grow on what we started last year,” Lillard said. “You continue to stay true to the small things that we committed to last year and get better that way. I don’t think you come back and say, ‘It’s a new year, let’s go change this and change that.’”

The Blazers fell to the Warriors in the Western Conference semifinals, and this season Golden State again looks to be the team to beat with the addition of Kevin Durant. The Blazers counter with a deep bench and should vie again for the Northwest Division title.

“We have a lot of players who can have an impact to finish games. The first three years, we were relying on the starters. Last year, the depth was versatile and helped us get through the season, and we improved on that this year,” coach Terry Stotts said. “We look at the season as a continuation of last season.”

Lillard averaged a career-high 25.1 points in the regular season, becoming the third

Portland player ever to average more than 25. He also averaged 6.8 assists.

Backcourt teammate CJ McCollum averaged 20.8 points in his first year as a starter, giving the Blazers their first backcourt duo with an average of 20 or more points apiece in a single season. He was named the league’s Most Improved Player.

Mason Plumlee returns as the starting center, with Al-Farouq Aminu at power forward. Maurice Harkless

and offseason addition Evan Turner have been competing in training camp for the other starting nod.

Other things to consider as the Trail Blazers prepare to open the season:

NEWCOMERS: Portland signed Turner and free agent forward Festus Ezeli, while trading for guard Shabazz Napier and rookie forward Jake Layman. Ezeli played last season for the Warriors and averaged seven points and 5.6 assists.

The win earns Echo a home game next week in the Special District 1 one-game playoff to determine state postseason berths.

Defensively Echo was paced by Klay Jenson with 19.5 tackles, and Ty Mulder with an interception and seven tackles. Echo coach Rich Thew said Mulder was also the team’s standout blocker on offense.

IRRIGON 0 — At Irrigon, the Pirates set a pace the Knights just couldn’t match to secure the Special District 4 title with a 6-0 win on Friday.

Miseal Madrigal scored the game’s first goal on pass from his brother Kevin in the seventh minute, and Ulises Lopez visited the net two minutes later.

We want you to do it in a game so we can adjust to what you do and learn that way instead of you trying to get used to us all the time.’”

ROAD TRIP!: The Trail Blazers once again embarked on a preseason team-bonding excursion to San Diego. The trip south was started by Lillard and McCollum in 2015. The team worked out at San Diego State and shared meals. “I always knew they were cool guys and they had good chemistry,” Ezeli said. “But I didn’t know the team was this tight.”

DEFENSE: Stotts has always emphasized defensive improvement, and this season is no different. The Blazers ranked 20th in the league for points allowed per game, 16th for opponents’ field-goal percentage and 17th for opponents’ points per shot.

INJURY UPDATE: Center Meyers Leonard has returned to the court ahead of schedule following shoulder surgery. Noah Vonleh has also returned from a procedure on his thigh. But the Blazers continue to wait on Ezeli, who had a left knee procedure in August. There is no timeline for his return, and the Blazers are acting cautiously.

Irrigon coach Paul Keefer said his team looked hesitant, and did not win a single 50-50 ball the entire game.

“We did not match their intensity in the first 20 minutes,” he said. “Riverside came out and showed exactly why they’re undefeated in league ranked third in the state. Granted it’s our third game this week, but we were really on our heels.”

Kevin Madrigal, Alejandro Llamas, Brock Rosen and Francisco Chavez also scored for Riverside (9-3-1, 6-0 SD4), which will finish league play on Tuesday when it hosts City Christian at 4 p.m.

Meanwhile, Irrigon (6-3-1, 2-2-1) will play at Umatilla (6-4-2, 2-2-1) on Tuesday at 4 p.m. in a game that will determine second place and a state playoff berth.

Washington’s rise began with Beavers

SEATTLE — The run that No. 5 Washington has been on for most of this season, surging in the polls and into the discussion for the College Football Playoff, is rooted in what happened at the end of 2015.

And it all started with a trip to Oregon State.

Last November, Washington was floundering, not flourishing. The Huskies had lost four of five and were coming off a fourth-quarter meltdown in a loss at Arizona State. Washington needed wins in its final two games to become bowl eligible and started the surge that has carried into this season with a 52-7 blowout of the Beavers.

Now Oregon State comes around again Saturday, with the Huskies (6-0, 3-0 Pac-12) on a nine-game winning streak.

It’s hard for Washington to be much better than the last time out, when it ended a 12-game losing streak to rival Oregon with a 70-21 pummeling of the Ducks.

Oregon State coach Gary Andersen certainly took notice and has raved all week about Washington’s talent while dealing with his own injuries that will likely leave the Beavers (2-4, 1-2) starting a third-string quarterback and backup running back.

“They are very dominant for most of the time in these games that they’re in,” Andersen said. “They’re dominant physically. They’re dominant from the speed standpoint.”

In his last start, Washington QB Jake Browning tied a Pac-12 record as he accounted for eight total touchdowns — six passing, two rushing — in the blowout win over Oregon. Browning leads the country in pass efficiency and completion percentage and is No. 2 in the nation in touchdown passes.

Cardinals look to end home skid vs Seattle

GLENDALE, Ariz. — Coach Bruce Arians has accomplished a lot in his three seasons with the Cardinals.

Beating Seattle in Arizona isn’t one of them.

That 0-3 record at home against the Seahawks was a major topic as the Cardinals prepared for the Sunday night matchup of two teams that have dominated the NFC West in recent years.

Corneback Patrick Peterson brought it up in the locker room moments after Arizona’s 28-3 victory over the New York Jets on Monday night.

The Cardinals have won two of their past three at Seattle, but the Seahawks have dominated the past three in Arizona by a combined score of 105-34.

Asked if there’s a common thread through those losses, Arians was characteristically blunt.

“Yeah,” he said. “They beat the (heck) out of us.”

There were some mitigating circumstances. The Cardinals were down to Ryan Lindley in a 35-6 loss late in the 2014 season. And

Arizona already had clinched the No. 2 playoff berth before a 36-6 loss to Seattle last season.

But another Seahawks victory this season would have a significant impact for both teams. Seattle would improve to 5-1, Arizona would drop to 3-4. A Cardinals win, on the other hand, would put Arizona just a half-game behind Seattle.

“This is a classic Western division matchup,” Seahawks coach Pete Carroll said. “We love it. They’re a great team and they bring out the best in us.”

But Carroll scoffs at the suggestion that a Seattle victory would lock up the NFC West.

“That’s crazy to think that,” he said. “That’s not how it is. It’s just one game, one week, and then there’s a bunch of other games after that. I’m not even going to answer that one.”
