No. 24 Beavers tame Bengals

CORVALLIS — The No. 24 Oregon State women’s basketball cruised over Idaho State 61-38 on Monday at Gill Coliseum.

Senior guard Sydney Wiese scored 13 points on 5-for-8 shooting from the floor, and set a career-high with six steals for the Beavers (2-0). Freshman Kat Tudor went 4-5 from beyond the arc to finish the game with 12 points.

Junior Marie Gulich hit on four of her five shot attempts to end the evening with 11 points, and she finished in double-digits for the second-straight game. She also set a career-high with five blocks.

SEAHAWKS: Prorise brings spark to running game

“We’ve had our struggles, but fortunately enough we’ve been on the positive side of it,” Seattle wide receiver Doug Baldwin said after the game. “So, as we continue to get healthy and continue to execute and get better at that, I think we’ll continue to improve and hopefully continue to win.

Seattle’s 31-24 victory over New England will be remembered for the final sequence — one that was eerily similar to when the teams met in the Super Bowl two years ago, except this time it was the Patriots who threw a failed pass from the 1-yard line. At Super Bowl XLIX, Russell Wilson’s pass was intercepted by Malcom Butler, giving New England its fourth championship. On Sunday, Tom Brady’s lob fell incomplete after an end-zone collision between

Rob Gronkowski and safety Kam Chancellor, sending the Seahawks home with an unlikely victory.

It won’t be considered one of Seattle’s most important victories under Carroll — there were too many games earlier in his tenure, before the Seahawks were established as regular contenders, that created the base for what’s become a four-year run as one of the top teams in the NFC.

But considering the circumstances, it ranks among the most impressive. Seattle was playing just six days after outlasting Buffalo on Monday night, traveling across the country on Friday for a Sunday night game against a rested Patriots squad that hadn’t played since winning at Buffalo on Oct. 30.

It was a scenario set for Seattle to fail. Instead, the Seahawks thrived.

“The mentality in believing that you’re going to get it done, remaining confident, finding the confidence that it takes to execute well, comes from experience and really good leadership,” Carroll said. “The guys, they were in it to win the thing all the way to the last inch and found a way.”

The victory was encouraging, and so was the re-emergence of Seattle’s offense following a sluggish first half of the season. Baldwin created headaches for defensive backs, especially near the end zone, where he caught three touchdowns for the first time since Week 14 of last season. Wilson looked as healthy as he has all season, throwing for 348 yards, and showing the elusiveness and ability to extend plays with his legs that’s been absent since suffering ankle and knee injuries in the first three weeks of the season.

But the most important change was a rushing attack that entered the week 30th in the NFL, averaging just 75 yards per game. Led by rookie C.J. Prorise, the Seahawks ran for 96 yards as a team. It’s not a significant total, but it was Seattle’s most yards on the ground since Week 3.

Prorise provided a missing spark, along with a solid night by Seattle’s maligned offensive line. The third-round pick, slowed early in the season by a broken bone in his hand, rushed for 66 yards on 17 carries and caught all seven targets for 87 yards.

“C.J. hit stuff really well. He took advantage of a leap forward from our guys up front,” Carroll said. “It was the most aggressive that we’ve been, the most confident coming off the ball. It was just the best outing that we’ve had. I think it all fit together.”

— with a \$15,481 lead, he couldn’t celebrate until the completion of Round 10.

Entering Round 10, Patterson held a \$21,905 lead over Cody Lee. The key was Lee was first in the average, while Patterson was third in the average after nine rounds.

The average was critically important for Patterson and Lee, because it paid out \$27,347 to the winner, \$22,632 for second place and \$17,917 for third. Mix in the average with the round money that paid \$9,155 and \$7,577 for first and second

place, respectively, and a gold buckle was still up for grabs between Patterson and Lee.

Lee roped before Patterson in Round 10 and tried to apply the pressure with a 13.5-second run. That gave Lee a 125.9-second total time, which secured first place in the 10-head average.

Patterson responded with an 11.1-second run to grab the coveted gold buckle.

“I have my own statistics I bring with me and they told me Cody had to win the round and win the average, and I had to fall off,” Patterson said. “I thought it would be good to get a check

in that last round and maybe that would clinch it for me. That steer was really good (Friday night), and he was trying to kick me pretty good down there, but it felt pretty good when I got that time.”

Patterson’s Round 10 time was good for fourth in the round and a \$4,420 paycheck, and Lee didn’t place in the round.

Lee was gracious in defeat, especially since he couldn’t have done much more. He won an NFSR record \$69,651, breaking the previous record of \$62,390 won by Brazile at the 2015 NFSR.

Lee was followed by Chet Herren in the average. Herren

had a 143.2-second time on 10 head. Patterson was third in the average with a 105.2-second time on nine steers.

“You can’t give Rocky a lead of over \$15,000 coming into the NFSR and expect to catch him,” Lee said. “I knew it was a longshot and I came up a little short. Still, winning this average is a great feeling and definitely my career highlight.”
