

SEAHAWKS: Prosise to RB No. 1

Seattle finished with 96 yards rushing as a team, which is still a meager total compared to what the Seahawks have done in the past, but was their highest since Week 3.

It was clear that a shift was happening and Michael’s time as the primary running back was ending, despite rushing for 469 yards and six touchdowns. But the move to waive Michael and replace him on the roster with undrafted rookie Troymaine Pope was a clear indication of what Seattle wants the hierarchy to be going forward.

“C.J. did a really good job. He’s doing the things we like seeing in him. We look forward to continue growing with him. That’s one,” Carroll said. “Thomas coming back, that’s two, and we’re all really excited about that. We’ve been waiting for that to happen.”

A year ago, Rawls was a breakout star, rushing for 830 yards and four touchdowns in seven starts while filling in for injured starter Marshawn Lynch. Rawls was on pace for a 1,000-yard season, despite getting limited carries early, before suffering a broken ankle in December against Baltimore.

Assuming he makes it through practice without setbacks, Rawls isn’t likely to be thrown back into carrying a huge load against Philadelphia. Before getting hurt in the first half of the Week 2 loss at Los Angeles, Rawls had just 19 carries for 25 yards and no run of longer than eight yards.

But how the carries are split appears to be less of a concern after what Prosise showed against New England. There were numerous questions about the one-time wide receiver who converted to running back at Notre Dame, most notably whether he had the

toughness to be more than a third-down back.

That seemed to be answered with one play in the first quarter when Prosise caught a short pass, raced down the sideline and lowered his shoulder into Duron Harmon and sent the defensive back sprawling.

“I was being physical, running downhill and initiating contact,” Prosise said. “That’s something I’ve been working on my game to get better at.”

The play resonated with his teammates, who erupted on the sideline after seeing Prosise show a level of physical play that was sometimes missing with Michael.

“Our whole sideline exploded in excitement about that,” wide receiver Doug Baldwin said. “Football is a violent sport and when you see things like that in that nature from guys you really haven’t seen anything from it gets you excited.”

win the gold medal, have the world record,” he said. “And then I can put that aside and try to play football. So I think that’s the ideal scenario.”

Allen appeared in the Ducks’ first three games this season before injuring his left knee and being ruled out for the rest of the season. Allen tore his anterior cruciate ligament during the fourth quarter of Oregon’s 35-32 loss at Nebraska on Sept. 17.

The 21-year-old, who said he will remain in Eugene, Oregon, to train, has two years of eligibility left in track at Oregon, and one year left for football.

He hopes to complete his degree in business administration in the spring.

“I think overall I had a great career and I feel like I had an awesome experience here, too,” he said during the announcement in Eugene. “My No. 1 goal was to get my degree so I’ll finish that in the spring, which is first and foremost. But playing two

sports in college is tough. I can definitely vouch for that, and trying to balance those two as well with school and the social life and, unfortunately the injuries, is tough.”

After competing in Rio, Allen was a late arrival for the Ducks’ fall camp but jumped right back into action. He appeared in the opener against UC Davis and started Week 2 against Virginia, catching a 77-yard touchdown pass.

Allen first made a splash as a redshirt freshman, finishing as the team’s third-best receiver with 41 catches for 684 yards and seven touchdowns — including an 80-yard TD against Washington State.

But his season ended when he injured his knee on the opening kickoff of Oregon’s Rose Bowl victory that year over Florida State. He required surgery and missed that season’s national championship game against Ohio State.

He spent much of last

season trying to return to form on the football field and the track — while eyeing the ultimate prize of an Olympic bid. He appeared in 12 games, but caught just nine passes for 94 yards.

Allen earned a spot on the Olympic team for Rio by winning the 110-meter hurdles in the Olympic Trials last July at Oregon’s Hayward Field. He also won the NCAA title in the event.

It was his second NCAA title — he won the championship as a freshman in 2014. He also won that year’s U.S. national championships in the 110-meter hurdles.

Allen said he was disappointed with his fifth-place finish in Rio.

“After the Olympics, I wasn’t frustrated, but I was a little unhappy with the way I finished,” he said. “And I just felt confident that if I spend full time focusing on track, like a lot of the other guys do, I think it would give me a better opportunity to perform well on that kind of stage.”

TIMBERWOLVES: Open 2016 season on the road at Mt. Hood on Sunday

Timberwolves is just acclimating freshmen that will be relied on heavily this season.

“I wish we had more sophomores, but we have a lot of freshmen, so that’s tough getting those guys ready to the college speed and size and physicality and all that stuff,” Burt said.

Also returning for the T-Wolves are 6-4 guard/forward Isaiah Harris, 6-0 guard Gunnar Blankenship and 5-5 point guard La’Quan Hawkins, who has some academic issues to clear up before he can see the court.

Harris was one of the team’s most accurate shooters as a freshman at 57 percent, and averaged 6.5 points and 3.3 rebounds. Hawkins was second on the team in minutes as their starting point guard, and averaged 5.9 points, 3.0 assists and one steal a game.

The immediate need to fill his position in the early portion of the schedule led to one of the bright spots of the preseason.

Burt said it’s become a two-player battle between 5-7 David Bravo of Henderson, Nevada, and 5-11 Darien Davis of Sacramento, California.

“Those two are the freshmen that have really opened our eyes to kind of, ‘OK these guys can play a little bit,’” he said. “Obviously you know that during the recruiting process, but you don’t truly know until you get them here playing full speed.”

Burt said a pair of freshmen guards from Nampa, Idaho, Justice Cook and Riley Brown, have also put themselves near the front of the line for early playing time.

The T-Wolves’ offense will depend on creative guard play to score points as Mathews is the team’s tallest player and the only others listed at forward are 6-6 Jacob Kasiorok and 6-3 Jacob Perez.

“Offensively we’ve really got to play small ball because we only have a couple 6-6 guys,” Burt said. “The rest of the guys are guards. So we’ve got to kind of space it out.

“I mean, you’re seeing it a lot in the NBA now with the (Golden State) Warriors. Kind of dribble drive and create off the dribble. A little different than last year, but the same concepts.”

Defensively the T-Wolves will look to create confusion and turnovers by throwing multiple looks at the opposition.

“Defensively we’re going to look to run a lot of presses,” Burt said. “We’re going to try and run some different zones and then as well in man to man, so try to mix it up defensively.”

With a game plan that will rely heavily on speed, the T-Wolves have been going at each other hard in practices to build up their conditioning.

“Everyone’s doing their best trying to improve each other. The competition level is high,” said Harris, noting the tempo in their split-squad scrimmages had been pretty intense. “I think we can be a pretty good team in our league. Of course like every other team we’re pushing to make NWACs, even

win NWACs.”

The Timberwolves’ first home game is Dec. 2 against Clackamas, and there are three locals on the T-Wolves roster this season.

Anthony Landeros, a 5-10 guard from Irrigon, is cleared to play after taking a medical redshirt last season, and is joined by Weston-McEwen’s Linton McAllister and Hermiston’s Lucas Wyant.

Landeros, the 2014-15 All-EO Basketball co-Player of the Year, said his season on the BMCC sideline was a blessing in disguise.

“It just gave me a really good view of what college basketball is like. I got to learn a lot, and I kind of got a year to grow up more,” he said. “It was a good experience for me just to realize how fast the game changes and just learning better from the coaches. I feel like I understand the game better.”

Landeros, whose high school team used stingy defenses to win back-to-back OSAA state titles in 2014-15, said he thinks that will be the T-Wolves’ strength this season,

which Mathews and Harris agreed with.

“We’re going to be good defensively, we’re going to be able to hold people down,” Landeros said. “Everybody just works hard and comes in and works every day, so we’ll see what we can do.”
