Biblical story of Jesus comes to life at outdoor village

Free interactive tours Dec. 2-4

interactive depicting the story of Jesus' birth and beyond returns for the Christmas season.

Journey to Bethlehem features the sights, sounds and smells of what life may have been like 2,000 years ago in the village. Jo Ann Rincker, a member of the Hermiston Seventh-day Adventist Church, has been involved with the production since its inception in 2008.

"To me, this is the real meaning of Christmas," she said. "There are some people out there who have never heard the story, so I think it's important to be told."

The free 20-30 minute guided tours are Friday, Dec. 2 through Sunday, Dec. 4 from 5-8:30 p.m. behind the Hermiston Seventh-day Adventist Church, 855 W. Highland Ave., Hermiston. While waiting for their tour to start, people are invited to wait in the warm church sanctuary and listen to music, To help families with younger children in regards to having to wait, kids will be given little packets with a booklet and activities. They will get to take the little prize home with them, Rincker said.

"I think it will help with the wait," she said. "In the past we have had problems with the wait being too long and we've had people leave because they have children that would get inpatient."

About 100 costumed actors participate in the dramatic production. In addition, there are people who take care of logistics, provide musical entertainment while guests wait for their guide serve refreshments for visitors after taking the journey. Also, assistants are available to help in maneu-

vering wheelchairs strollers, as needed.

Starting out with members of the Hermiston and Anchor Point Seventh-day Adventist churches, other churches and community members have got involved with the effort. Located near the Seventh-day Adventist Church, the First Christian Church provides

Also, live animals include everything from sheep, goats and chickens to llamas, which are dressed up to look like little camels. The animals, Rincker said, help provide an authentic experience of entering a Biblical village.

Rincker said when they embarked on the first production, they didn't know how it would be received.

"We said if people stop coming out, we'll know we've run our course," she said.

Other than one year when temperatures dipped down to single digits and below, the production has increased attendance numbers each year. The first production, Rincker said, had 400 people going through. Last year, there were more than 2,000.

Provided as an outreach ministry, it's important to organizers to offer the experience free of charge. Some people, Rincker said, might not be able to attend if they

'It's something we want to provide for our community,' she said.

Last year, Sheila Botti, also of the Hermiston Seventh-day Adventist Church, said operating expenses are about \$3,000. That figure includes the cost of upgrades, as well as replacing costumes and providing refreshments. Donations are gladly accepted.

may be wrong, but I suspect that you may be reading this either on Friday or Saturday. This means that you have been to at least one Thanksgiving feast, possibly two or more. Your body is attempting portals of your humanity

to process an avalanche of calories still residing in the and swearing never again

to eat as much. This is of course an oath likely to be circumvented at Christmas — and maybe even this weekend when a torrent of leftovers befall us.

Last Sunday my flock at Good Shepherd Lutheran Church was somewhat diminished as people began heading to the four corners of the world to feast with relatives and friends. So my sermon fell on a lot of empty seats. My sermon used our lectionary text from Luke, where Christ was on the cross, beginning to die. Besides him were two genuine criminals who had also been sentenced to death.

It's a strange text to read just before Christmas, and also a strange text for the week of Thanksgiving. It seems quite out of balance for the mood of the season. Yet the text is about a significant moment in human history when the world of humans changed dramatically.

The crowd was jeering and mocking Jesus, saying, "Save yourself!! Save yourself!" — and even one of the real criminals hanging beside the Lord joined in the scorn. But the other criminal said to his fellow crook that while they were getting their just desserts, Jesus had done nothing at all to warrant a sentence of death! This man turned to look and

Jesus and asked him to remember him when Jesus entered his Kingdom. Jesus replied that in fact, that very day this man, this convicted man, would enter Paradise with Jesus. This is why the text is so wonderful. This criminal, this man who admitted his own guilt, was the first of us to enter Paradise. The

first of many! There is no word from Jesus pronouncing forgiveness — it wasn't even asked for by the crook, but this poor man merely asked that he be remembered, not saved. Yet, all the above actually happened by Jesus' command.

You, my readers, too, will see this man in Paradise. Although it is a timeless state, Thanksgiving and Christmas are all present here in joy. Christ and this convict, among many others, will be there to welcome us into the bliss that is God's presence.

When I was a chaplain I came into a man's hospital room. He was grinning from ear to ear. He was a Lutheran, and he was about to die. The week before he had died on the operating table and had been brought back by the doctors. In that time of temporary death he had seen paradise and met his master. Never had I seen such a joyful man. We talked for a while and prayed together. He had no fear and told me he looked forward to getting back there.

So I ask that you be as fortunate as that crucified criminal and that Jesus remembers you and welcomes you into Paradise. Welcome him into your life.
