Food drive feeds Christmas Express

Area students help spread holiday cheer

Ric Sherman has a way of getting kids fired up. The retired educator was met with the deafening screams of students during a recent assembly at Armand Larive Middle School. Sherman announced the annual food drive competition pitting the Bullpups against the Sandstone Middle School Desert Hawks. Food collected from the effort will be distributed through the Hermiston Police Department Christmas Express.

First coordinating the food drive in 1979, Sherman gets excited about students making a difference in the lives of others.

"The biggest contribution of food to this program is the schools," Sherman said. "Our kids are really great kids." Ben DeCarlow, Armand Larive seventh/eighth grade science teacher, said the food drive raises student awareness of needs in the community. It also helps drive home an understanding, DeCarlow said, that even as middle schoolers, they can contribute and help make a difference.

In addition, DeCarlow said it gets students pumped up in being victorious over Sandstone.

"That's one of the things they take pride in — that Armand has been the winner of the cross-town rivalry with Sandstone in recent years," he said.

Sherman, a sort of ambassador for the Christmas Express program, said the program started 47 years ago when Ken Hodge, then manager of the Hermiston Sears, had some extra toys and called Bob Shannon, who was the Hermiston police chief, asking if he knew of some needy

families they could be distributed to.

"It had humble beginnings," Sherman said.

Now, 500 families benefit from the program. Many individuals and groups, Sherman said, help in providing a bright spot during the holiday season.

"This is definitely Hermiston's finest hour," he said.

Top collectors will earn the privilege of attending a special Hermiston Rotary Club luncheon with their principal and sit at the table of honor with Mayor Dave Drotzmann. The meeting also features a "fleecing," Sherman said. Rotarians willingly open their wallets to provide seed money for next year's Christmas Express.

During the assembly, Armand Larive principal Stacie Roberts encouraged students to talk to their families about making a food donation.

"We're not asking you to strip your pantry," she said.

Meanwhile, don't be surprised if an exuberant youth shows up at your door asking if you'd like to donate food for the effort — remember, there is a contest going on. The competition continues through Dec. 9.

Recipients of Christmas Express don't sign themselves up. Names can be suggested through social service agencies, civic groups, churches or even neighbors, Sherman said. They must be submitted by Friday.
