

# THOMAS:

Steven Terrell is a solid replacement with experience in Seattle's system and one start already this season, he's not Thomas, as Carroll said.

"You can't make up for it. You just try to find some others who can do half of what he does," Seattle defensive end Michael Bennett said Sunday night. "It's hard to replace that kind of player who's a Hall of Fame type of player. You can't really replace (them)."

Thomas was injured in the second quarter of the blowout victory, colliding with teammate Kam Chancellor as each tried to intercept a pass from Carolina quarterback Cam Newton. It was a violent and high-speed collision that Carroll said Monday also left Chancellor a little banged up.

It's the first major injury of Thomas' career and the emotional safety immediately became reflective, tweeting during the game that he was contemplating retirement.

"I know it's really generated a lot of curiosity," Carroll said. "He's going through, at the time, the emotional part of dealing with an injury that's a serious setback. I don't know much more about it than that."

Thomas has been a constant in Seattle's secondary since he arrived in 2010 as the second draft pick made by Carroll and general manager John Schneider. He started 106 consecutive games, a streak that was snapped last week when he sat out against Tampa Bay due to a hamstring injury.

Thomas furiously rehabbed the injury in order to play against the Panthers. And he lasted barely one quarter before suffering an even more significant blow.

Carroll said the freedom with how Thomas plays is the most difficult aspect to replace.

"The experience that Earl has, has given him freedom to see things, make plays, feel confident making breaks on balls and taking shots on stuff. That comes from a lot of success, confidence building success," Carroll said. "You get bold. Earl has become that kind of player for us."

Terrell has been with Seattle since 2014, signed in part because of the quickness he brought to the secondary. He's mostly been a special teams contributor, but played well a week ago against Tampa Bay with Thomas sidelined.

"It's really important because we're playing a lot of three-deep and you've got to cover a lot of ground out there," Carroll said of Terrell. "We've had guys who don't have 4.3 (40-yard dash) speed that have played over the years but it sure helps."

# BUCKS: McGlothan has another double-double

30-point lead late in the second half. A big key for the Bucks was offensive efficiency, as the team collectively shot 57 percent from the floor (27-47) and 59 percent 3-point range (10-17). The team also had just 12 turnovers and 22 assists.

"Shoot 57 percent and 59 percent and yeah, you'll be in a good shape each game," Tedder said of the offense. "That's a testament to moving the ball and sharing the ball and getting good shots up."

Smith was the star once again for the Buckaroos, putting up a game-high 24 points on 8-14 shooting to go with six rebounds and seven assists. He had 14 points in the third quarter alone as he knocked down 4-5 attempts from the 3-point line in the quarter.

"The defenders weren't getting up too close on me so I just pulled a couple and they all happened to go in," Smith said with a wide grin. "It really felt good to get going like that."

But like Smith in the third quarter, Pendleton also got big contributions from guys throughout the game such as Tyler Newsom with 15 points total and eight in the fourth quarter, and Ryan Russell who had seven points and three offensive rebounds in the second quarter to boost the Bucks.

Smith said having that balance on a consistent basis will be important for the Buckaroos moving forward.

"It's just working as a team and being more we guys than me guys, not caring who scores the ball as long as it gets done," he said. Tedder agrees.

"We're trying to preach that it takes all 11 guys on the bench, in the game, to trust that good things are going to happen," he said. "Obviously Caden's our go-to guy but he's also got to trust and put guys in good spots for them to be successful and take pressure away from him and he's doing that. Also Tyler (Newsom) was huge, Johnny (Stuvland) played really well, I could go down the line."

Another area that Tedder was happy with was the team total of 22 assists. Junior guard Shaw Jerome led the team with 12 assists overall, and left his coach impressed.

"Shaw played really well, getting 12 of our 22 assists. He's still an inexperienced player but he's learning quickly and developing into a pretty good point guard for us," Tedder said.

Pendleton next plays on Friday night when they host Walla Walla at 7 p.m.

The 5-foot-8 forward was a little undersized for her position, but often made up for the height difference with a work ethic and physical presence around the basket. She performed well enough to garner first team all-league honors and helped her Buckaroo team to a spot

in the 5A play-in round.

But so far in 2016, McGlothan appears to have taken her game to another level. The junior recorded her third-straight double-double on Tuesday night with 18 points and 14 rebounds to help her Buckaroos to a 44-40 come-from-behind victory over the Southridge (WA) Suns at

Warberg Court.

McGlothan said she attributes her torrid start to a smooth transition period between volleyball and basketball seasons.

"I really love basketball and when I came into the season I thought 'Oh I'm out of shape' but then the first game hit and I felt like I had never stopped playing," she said. "I've felt great and I hope to keep it going for the rest of the year."
