This is a **drone**. A drone is a flying gadget that is flown by remote control.

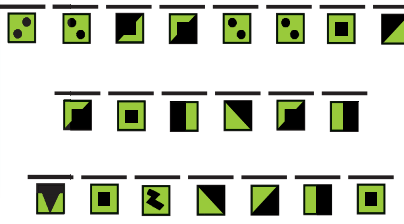

Firefighters use them to watch forest fires. Why?

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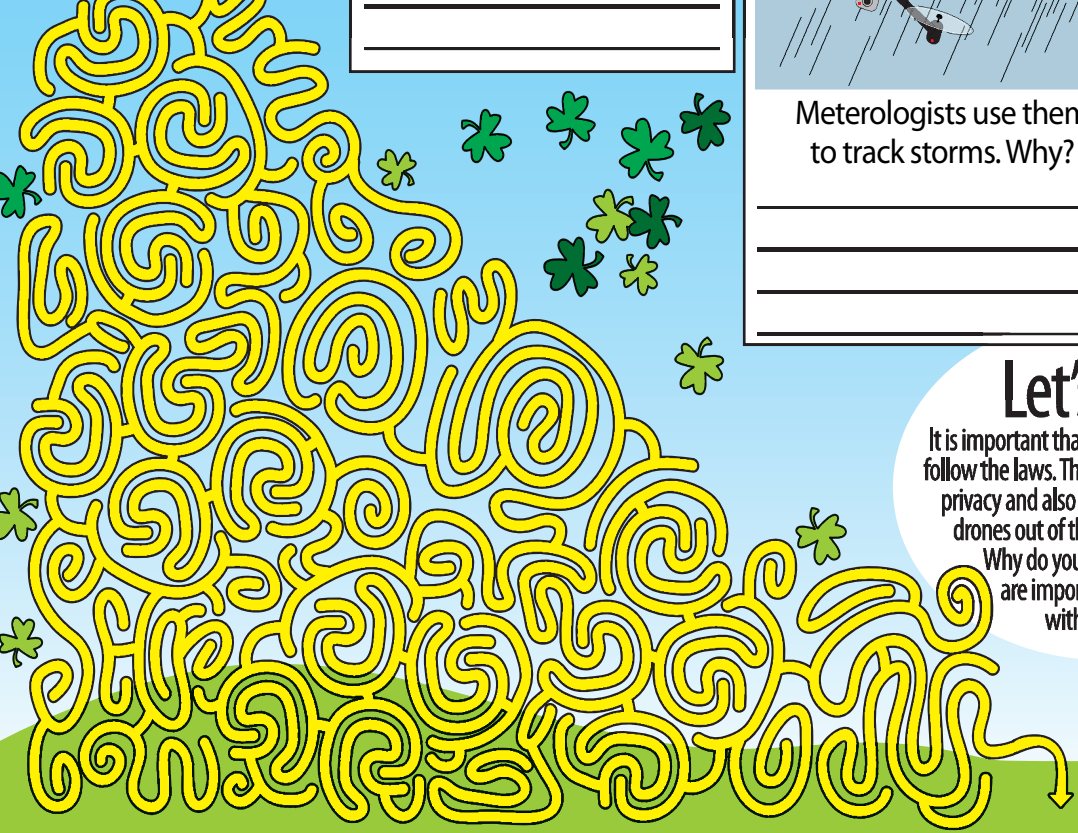


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Bring this drone in for a safe landing.



## Drones are not toys

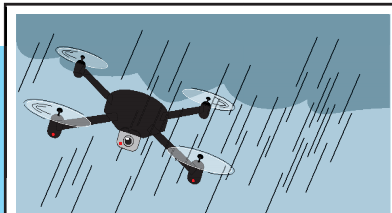

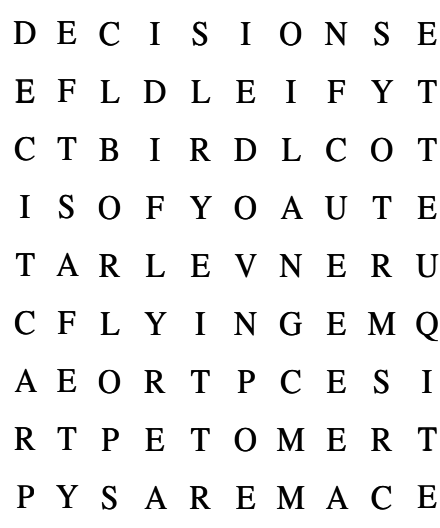
