

glove of Ridgeview's catcher and rolled behind home plate, causing the catcher to have trouble locating the ball. And as soon as Gritz saw the ball squirt out of the glove, he was off, sprinting as hard and as fast as he could toward home plate where he finished off with a

head-first slide across the plate to give Hermiston the 7-6 win over Ridgeview on Tuesday afternoon at Armand Larive Middle School.

It is the first season-opening win for Hermiston since 2013, when the Bulldogs took down Oregon City by the same 7-6 score and have since lost two-straight openers to Ridgeview prior.

"We made progress throughout the games, but we expect our pitchers to throw strikes and our defense to make the plays behind them. "Southridge is one of the best teams we'll play all season. Our plate approaches got better throughout the day, and you never like to start 0-2 but we've just got to keep battling. We'll be fine.' Daniel Naughton and Austin Zaugg were the starting pitchers for the Bucks and took the losses. Nick Bower batted 2-for-3 in Game 2, Hayden Villers was 1-for-1 and Jared Beveridge was 1-for-2 with a double.

Pendleton softball opens at home with win over Hanford

For the third straight season the Buckaroos opened the season against the Hanford Falcons, and for the third straight season Pendleton opened with a win.

Junior Lauren Richards threw the first six innings of a combined one-hit shutout sophomore and Kirah McGlothan went 2-for-2 at the plate with an RBI triple as the Bucks manufactured five runs off four hits for the 5-0 win on



Tuesday at Steve Cary Field.

Richards, making her first opening-day start, struck out five of the first nine batters she faced and didn't

allow a runner past second base. She finished with six strikeouts, one hit, a pair of walks and one hit batter. "It felt like it was the first game,"

Richards said. "We do have a lot of hope for our season, I think we just needed to get that first game kind of out of there. ... I don't get nervous often, but I set high expectations for myself so I did get a little nervous at the beginning.

Pendleton coach Tim Cary was pleased with the outcome.

"I thought Lauren did a great job hitting her spots, and she always does," he said. "She had command of her pitches, worked the ball in, worked the ball out. I thought she took charge of the whole game did exactly what she needed to do.'

Junior Alexi Brehaut kept the shutout intact in the seventh with a strikeout and a walk.

Both pitchers were able to rely on a steady defense, which reserved its only error for the first play of the game. Richards came through for her defense to make up for it, and got two strikeouts and a grounder back to the circle to strand the runner.

Cavs anticipating Love's return

CLEVELAND (AP) - Cleveland Cavaliers general manager David Griffin anticipates forward Kevin Love will return during the team's trip that begins Saturday. Love had surgery on his left knee Feb. 14.

The defending NBA champions are 7-6 since he was injured and have been plagued by defensive and rebounding issues without the four-time All-Star.

Love is having his best season since joining the Cavaliers in 2014, averaging 20 points and 11.1 rebounds. Cleveland was outre-

bounded 52-38 in Sunday's loss to Houston. Griffin said Love participated in 3-on-3 drills

Tuesday and the team will monitor how he responds before deciding on the next step. The nine-year veteran posted a photo of his uniform hanging in his locker before the Cavaliers' game against the Detroit Pistons.

Capitals snap losing streak, beat Wild 4-2

WASHINGTON (AP) — Alex Ovechkin ended the longest goal-scoring drought of his career as the Washington Capitals held on to beat the Minnesota Wild 4-2 Tuesday night and snap a season-worst four-game losing streak.

Ovechkin hadn't scored in 10 games or had an even-strength goal in 18 before firing a one-timer by league save percentage leader Devan Dubnyk in the second period. Ovechkin's 28th goal of the season came 1 second after a power play expired.

Nate Schmidt, Evgeny Kuznetsov and Jay Beagle also scored for the NHL-leading Capitals, who recaptured sole possession of first in the Metropolitan Division.

Goaltender Braden Holtby put on a show, stopping 32 of 34 shots as the Capitals moved two points up on the Pittsburgh Penguins.
