Beavers set Pac-12 win record

CORVALLIS — Top-ranked Oregon State defeated Washington State 14-3 on Sunday to set the Pac-12 record for most league wins in a season with 27.

The Beavers (45-4, 27-3) topped the mark of 26 conference victories set by Arizona State in 1981.

Drew Rasmussen made his second start and fourth appearance since having Tommy John surgery, allowing three hits in 5 2/3 for the win. Rasmussen has allowed one

earned run in his 11 2/3 innings.

Nick Madrigal hit a three-run homer in the Beavers' seven-run fifth inning, and drove in two more runs in the seventh.

Madrigal didn't think a lot of his teammates were aware of the record.

"It's one of those things that's nice," he said, "but there's still a lot more ahead of us."

Oregon State has already secured the Pac-12 regular-season title and is expected



to be among the top eight national seeds for the NCAA Tournament when the brackets are announced next Monday.

The Beavers have won all 10 of their Pac-12 series this season, seven by sweeps. Their 45 regular-season wins match the team record set in 2013.

Oregon State wraps up the regular season with a four-game series at home against Abilene Christian starting on Thursday.

Ducks roll into Super Regionals

EUGENE — The No. 3 seed Oregon softball team run-ruled Wisconsin, 9-0, in five innings on Sunday afternoon to clinch a spot in the super regional round next weekend.

Like on Saturday against the Badgers, the Ducks got on the scoreboard in the first inning. Danica Mercado, who walked to leadoff the frame, scored on an RBI fielder's choice before Miranda Elish drove in a pair with a bases loaded single. A fourth run scored on Lauren Lindvall's RBI single up the middle.

After scoreless second and third innings, the Ducks exploded for five runs in the fifth to put the game away.

The Ducks loaded the bases with no outs after Elish reached via a single, Lindvall was hit by a pitch and Jenna Lilley dropped down a bunt single.

Mercado came up and doubled to right to drive in a pair and, with runners now on second and third, April Utecht lined a pinch-hit single up the middle to drive in another two runs. With an 8-0 lead, Alexis Mack scampers home from third on a fielder's choice

grounder, beating the play at the plate.

Elish led the Ducks at the dish and in the circle. She went 2-for-3 with two RBIs as a hitter while also tossing a one-hit shutout. She walked three with a pair of strikeouts.

Shannon Rhodes was named Eugene Regional MVP after hitting .778 over the three games with two doubles and four RBIs. Rhodes has a team-high 15-game hitting streak going into super regionals next weekend. She has 14 RBIs over the Ducks'

last six games.

Oregon is now an incredible 24-0 in NCAA Regional games under head coach Mike White. In his eight seasons as head coach in Eugene, the Ducks have advanced to the super regional round each year.

UP NEXT The Ducks will play host to No. 14 seed Kentucky in Super Regionals in Eugene May 25-28. Oregon and Kentucky will meet at 4 p.m. on Friday (ESPNU) and Saturday (ESPNU), and noon on Sunday (ESPNU).

PENDLETON — The Sherman Huskies scored 13 runs in the sixth inning to jump out in front of the Pilot Rock baseball team in Saturday's Special District 6 semifinals, and the Rockets were unable to come back in a 15-5 loss at Pendleton's Bob White Park.

Pilot Rock took a 5-0 lead into the top of the sixth, but the Huskies connected for 10 hits and also drew three walks to burst ahead.

Pilot Rock starter Levi Thieme struck out seven in the first five innings, but left with one out in the sixth after a bases-loaded walk pushed in Sherman's first run.

The first seven batters reliever Braydon Postma faced put the ball in play, and a single by Brett Troutman brought Jacob

Justesen in to make it 6-5 as the eventual game-winning run.

Sherman reliever Max Martin took the mound in the second inning and got the win allowing four runs on four hits over 3 1/3 innings. Troutman pitched the last two and allowed just one hit.

Treve Martin was 4 for 5 at the plate for Sherman, and Trey Homer was 3 for 5 with three RBI.

No Rocket got more than one hit, but Postma drove in two runs and also scored twice.

Sherman lost to Dufur 5-0 in the championship, and all three teams advance to the first round of the 2A/1A state playoffs.

Pilot Rock enters the bracket with a No. 9 seed and will play at No. 8 Umpqua Valley Christian on Wednesday at 4:30 p.m.

Predators reach Stanley Cup Final

NASHVILLE, Tenn. — Colton Sissons scored his third goal with 6:00 left, ensuring the Nashville Predators' magical postseason now includes the franchise's first trip to the Stanley Cup Final after eliminating the Anaheim Ducks with a 6-3 win on Monday night.

The Predators, who've never won even a division title in their 19-year history, came in with the fewest points of any team in these playoffs.

Now they've swept the West's No. 1 seed in Chicago, downed St. Louis in six in the second round and then the Pacific Division champ in six games.

"It feels so good," Sissons said. "Listen to this crowd. Our fans are amazing, a great group of guys. We just believe in ourselves. That's all it is."

Peter Laviolette became the fourth coach to take three different teams to the Final, and the first since the

playoffs split into conference play in 1994.

The Predators will play either defending champion Pittsburgh or Ottawa for the Stanley Cup. Game 1 is Monday.

Anaheim lost in the conference finals for the second time in three years.
