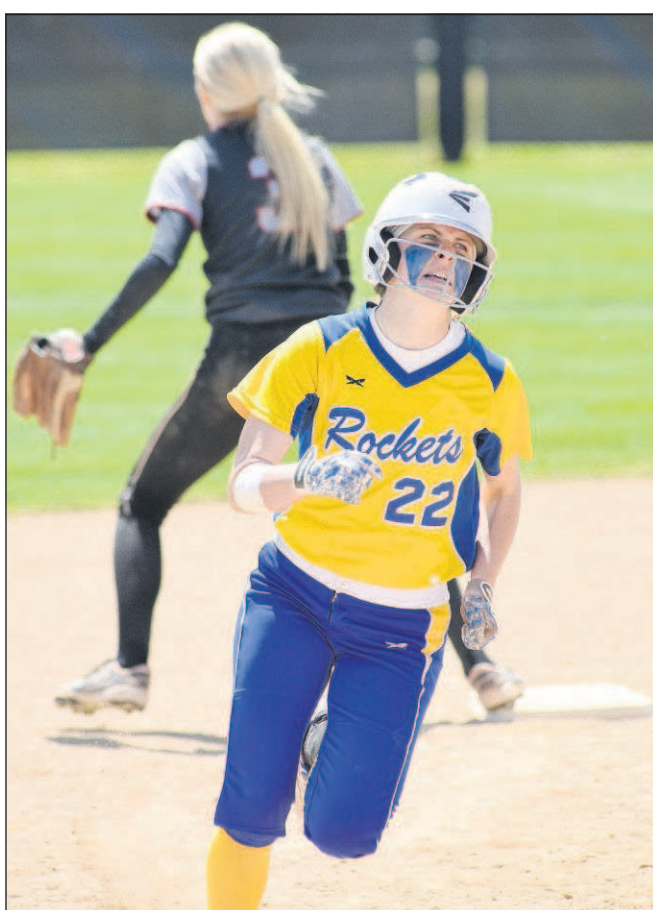
Stacy Fitzpatrick had runners at second and third with two outs. Brielle Howland, a courtesy runner for Ostrom, attempted to score from third on a wild pitch but she was tagged at the plate to end the inning.

Ostrom gave everything she had to try and match Derrick in the circle for the Rockets, which made for an entertaining afternoon. The Rockets' senior struck out nine and walked two, while giving up eight hits and two earned runs.

"She had a great game," Fitzpatrick said. "She's a tough kid who always plays good in big games and she was out there fighting today. Maybe I made some mistakes in calling pitches but I was proud of her."

Knotted at 1-1 in the sixth, North Douglas got to Ostrom with a one-out double by catcher Nikki Toy and then an intentional walk to Derrick. Ostrom then got a big strikeout to stand one out away from escaping the jam, however back-to-back singles by Amy Dooley and Erika Dickey drove in a pair of runs to give the Warriors a 3-1 lead.

Pilot Rock showed it might not take long to answer as Bekah Roe drilled a triple to right-center field to lead off the bottom of the sixth. But Derrick settled in and attacked the Rockets, inducing and infield pop fly, a strikeout and a lazy ground-ball out to leave Roe stranded.

a base hit as Shayla Walker lined one to left field. But she would not get past second base as the Rockets find hits, with Derrick striking out pinch hitter Jillian Adlard to end the game and seal the title.

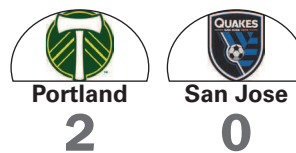

Valeri scores twice to lead Timbers over Earthquakes

PORTLAND — Diego Valeri scored two goals to give the Portland Timbers a 2-0 victory over the short-handed San Jose Earthquakes on Friday night.

Valeri opened the scoring in the 50th minute, knocking a pass from Zarek Valentin towards Fanendo Adi with his chest, then continuing his run. Instead of playing the ball, Adi stepped to the side and let Valeri run onto his own pass, where he slid an 18-yard shot past San Jose goalkeeper David



Bingham and off the inside of the post.

The Timbers sealed the win in the last minute of stoppage time. A short-range shot from Adi hit the post, but bounced right to Valeri, who slid to knock the ball into an open net for his team-leading 8th goal of the season.

Mariners use long ball to beat Rays

SEATTLE — Danny Valencia hit a three-run homer and tied a career high with five RBIs, Taylor Motter connected for a first-inning grand slam off Jake Odorizzi, and the Seattle Mariners routed the Tampa Bay Rays 12-4 on Friday night.

Seattle jumped on Odorizzi (3-3) for five runs in the first, although none were earned after Brad Miller's error at second base helped create the big inning. Valencia started his night with a two-out, bases-loaded walk and Motter followed with his second slam of the season. He also hit one April 23 at Oakland.

While Motter's sixth homer staked Seattle to a big early lead, Valencia's fifth home run broke the game open. Despite being out in front on a breaking ball, Valencia was able to keep his bat back long enough to line Odorizzi's final pitch into the left-field bullpen for a three-run shot and an 8-0 advantage.

Valencia added an RBI single as part of Seattle's four-run seventh to match his career high. Valencia's last five-RBI game also came against Tampa Bay last season.

That was plenty of offense for Seattle starter Christian Bergman, who pitched well

for the third time in his last four starts. Bergman (3-2) threw seven shutout innings against Boston in his previous outing and followed up by allowing just a pair of solo home runs over six innings against the Rays.

With the exception of a 10-1 loss at Washington, where Bergman allowed 14 hits and all 10 runs, the right-hander has been outstanding since being plugged into a Mariners rotation decimated by injuries.

Colby Rasmus and Tim

Beckham hit back-to-back homers off Bergman in the fourth, and Kevin Kiermaier added a two-run shot off reliever James Pazos in the seventh.

It was the first time since late in the 2012 season that Odorizzi failed to finish at least three innings in a game when he wasn't injured. Odorizzi left a start earlier this season against Boston after the first pitch of the second with a hamstring strain. He had pitched at least six innings in six of his nine starts entering Friday.

1994. Jake Meyers (8-2) allowed five runs on nine hits through 5 2/3 innings for the Huskers, making their third postseason appearance in five years.

Luis Alvarado hit an RBI single in the bottom of the first for the Huskers (35-20-1).

Andrew Herrera added a solo home run for the Bulldogs in the second for a 3-1 lead.
