

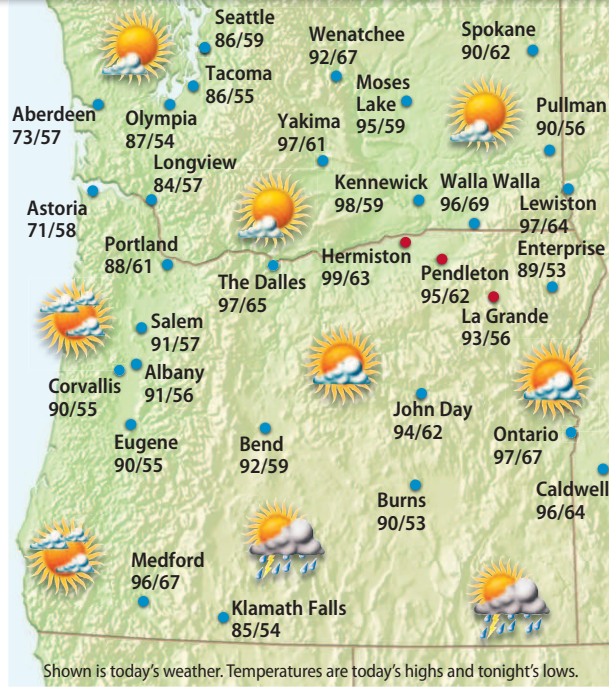

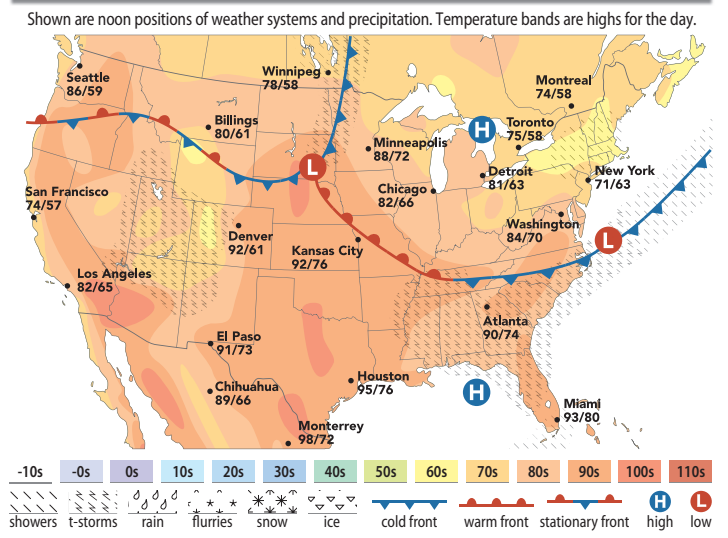

Chief Joseph Days kicks off 72nd year in Wallowa County

Nonstop fun — both in and out of the rodeo arena — is featured during the 72nd annual Chief Joseph Days.

The thundering start to the event is Tuesday at 1:30 p.m. with the Bucking Horse Stampedede down Joseph's Main Street. The event features Bridwell Pro Rodeo Company's bucking horses. Chief Joseph Days centers around four nightly Pro Rodeo Cowboy Association performances Wednesday through Saturday at 7 p.m. at the Harley Tucker Memorial Arena. Tickets range from \$14 to \$20. In addition, food and craft vendors will be plentiful throughout the week.

In its third year, the Chief Joseph Days Little Buckaroo Rodeo for Special Needs Children & Adults is Wednesday at 9 a.m. Participants engage in rodeo activities at no charge and will receive a cowboy hat, T-shirt, bandana and a lariat. The nightly rodeo opens with the Tuckerettes, a team of six expert horsewomen. The cowgirls get the action started when they explode into the arena. The energy will be palpable as Joseph native

Derek Kolbaba is expected to defend his 2016 Chief Joseph Days bull riding title. The great-grandson of Chief Joseph Days founder Harley Tucker, Kolbaba is currently ranked third in the world standings.

Wednesday is Family Night, with kids 6-and-under admitted free. In addition, family-friendly fun is planned after the rodeo in the adjacent Thunder Room — including a dance and free mechanical bull rides for the kids.

Proceeds from Thursday night's Tough Enough To Wear Pink will be donated to Wallowa Memorial Hospital in Enterprise, which offers free 3-D mammograms for low-income women. Earlier in the day, people can participate in the Miles for Mammo-

gram Walk, with registration at 8 a.m. and the event at 9 a.m.

Friday activities include an American Legion breakfast (5:30 a.m.), a golf tournament (7 a.m.) and the Kiddie Parade (10 a.m.) And Saturday features the Grand Parade (10 a.m.), the Friendship Feast (noon), a traditional American Indian dance contest (3 p.m.) and a teen dance (9 p.m.), which costs \$5 and features Full Tilt Audio.

The cowboy breakfast starts Saturday night at 11 p.m. and continues into Sunday morning. The event crescendos with a cowboy church service Sunday at 8 a.m.

Contractors begin water meter replacements

HERMISTON — The city of Hermiston has begun the process of replacing its

water meters.

Personnel from National Meter and Automation will be stopping by homes around town to clean debris out of the meter boxes and modify lids in preparation for installation of the meters. The company will also be installing a long-term form of insulation that does not need to be taken out each spring. At no time in the process will contractors need access to the inside of the home.

Once the meter has been replaced customers will

need to run their bathtub or outside faucet for about two minutes to expel any air or debris before using the water in their home. The contractors are beginning in the southwest corner of Hermiston.

The new "smart" meters can be read remotely and will also give customers a more detailed record of their daily water usage.
