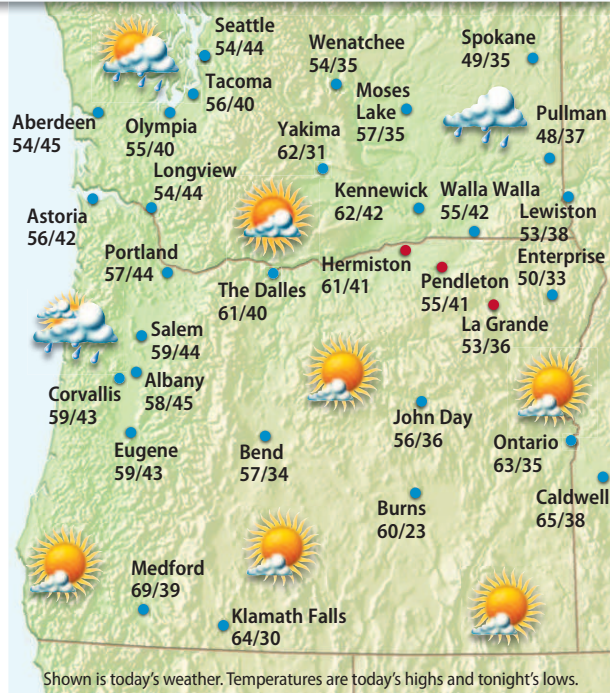

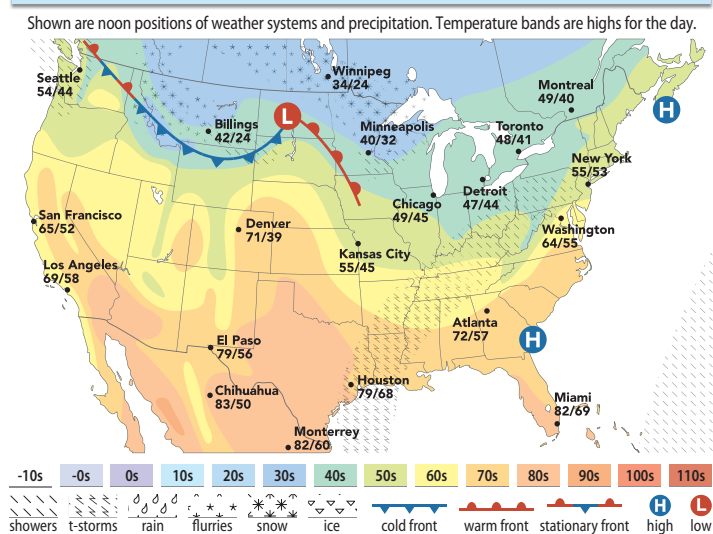

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Investigation finds 30 children, adults exposed to pesticide

PORTLAND (AP) — At least 30 children and adults are believed to have been affected at a Coos Bay childcare center where they were exposed to pesticide, according to a state investigation.

The Oregon Health Authority released the findings Monday about its investigation of the May outbreak, *the Oregonian*/OregonLive reported.

Children and employees at the Coos Bay Children's Academy Inc. reportedly suffered respiratory, eye and skin problems, according to the investigation. The harm was considered minimal, state officials said.

Officials would not say how many of the 30 people affected were children.

Improper application of flea spray designated for use in and around animal housing led to the incident, the investigation determined.

A preliminary count in June said 43 children and seven adults had reported health problems after the outbreak. Investigations later found that not all of the initial cases were related to the day care, said Jonathan Modie, a state spokesman.

The owner of the day care,

Elizabeth Ewing, and her husband Gerald Ewing were fined more than \$2,000 by the Oregon Department of Agriculture and the state's Occupational Safety and Health Administration for various violations regarding the incident.

Authorities ID teen fatally shot by police near Grand Ronde

SALEM (AP) — The Polk County District Attorney's Office has released the name of the 17-year-old suspected carjacker who was fatally shot by deputies.

The teen — Baltazar Escalona-Baez of Silverton — died at the scene Saturday after a confrontation with Polk County deputies. District Attorney Aaron Felton says a grand jury will review the case to determine whether the shooting was justified.

The Statesman Journal reports Escalona-Baez attended Silverton High School as a junior during the 2016-2017 school year. He did not register as a student for the current school year.

Officials say they received a report at about 4 a.m. Saturday of an armed carjacker who stole a Toyota Corolla from a grocery store parking lot in Salem. The shots were fired after a vehicle pursuit ended on Highway 18 near Grand Ronde.

Eying expansion, OSU-Cascades to buy landfill for \$1

BEND (AP) — Oregon State University-Cascades plans to buy an old landfill in Bend for \$1.

The Bulletin newspaper reports that the Deschutes County Commission approved the agreement Monday with a 2-1 vote. Oregon State University President Ed Ray is expected to sign the agreement later this week, finalizing it.

The 72-acre landfill property sits next to the university's 10-acre campus and an old pumice mine it owns.

The university hopes to expand by building in the former mine and on the old landfill.

Oregon girl, 13, hit and killed while waiting for school bus

CENTRAL POINT (AP) — Authorities say a 13-year-old girl who was found with fatal injuries on the side of a rural Oregon road was waiting for the school bus when she was hit by a vehicle.

Jackson County sheriff's deputies said Tuesday they don't know who hit Meadow Boyd early Monday and say the person may not realize they struck her.

A passer-by spotted Boyd lying along the road and performed CPR until paramedics arrived. She was pronounced dead at the hospital.

Authorities are asking anyone who drove on the 5100-block of East Evans Creek Road between Rogue River and Wimer between 6:45 a.m. and 7:29 a.m. on Monday to check their vehicle for damage. They are also seeking private surveillance video from that area that could help solve the case.

Two states warn Trump against big changes in sage grouse plan

FORT COLLINS, Colo. (AP) — Two Western governors are warning the Trump administration against making big changes in a plan to protect a ground-dwelling bird across the West, saying it would send a message to states not to bother working together to save other imperiled species.

Colorado Democratic Gov. John Hickenlooper and Wyoming Republican Gov. Matt Mead said Tuesday a 2015 conservation plan designed to save the greater sage grouse was the product of long negotiations among state and federal governments, conservation groups, industry and agriculture.

The plan is designed to protect the bird without putting it on the

Endangered Species List, which usually brings restrictions on oil and gas drilling, mining and agriculture.

Interior Secretary Ryan Zinke said in August his department would consider changing the plan to give states more flexibility.

Oregon police chief retires after investigation

WEST LINN (AP) — West Linn Police Chief Terry Timeus has retired from the department.

The move announced by the city Tuesday comes a month after the Washington County District Attorney's Office said it wouldn't charge the chief with driving under the influence of intoxicants.

City police officers said the chief had bloodshot eyes and slurred his words when he drove up to them during a May shift. The chief was off-duty at the time.

The DA's office said it didn't find enough evidence to prove the allegation beyond a reasonable doubt.

Timeus spent months on paid administration leave during the investigation, and the city describes his departure as a mutual parting of ways.

Timeus was appointed chief in 2005. He's credited with overseeing the construction of a new police station.
