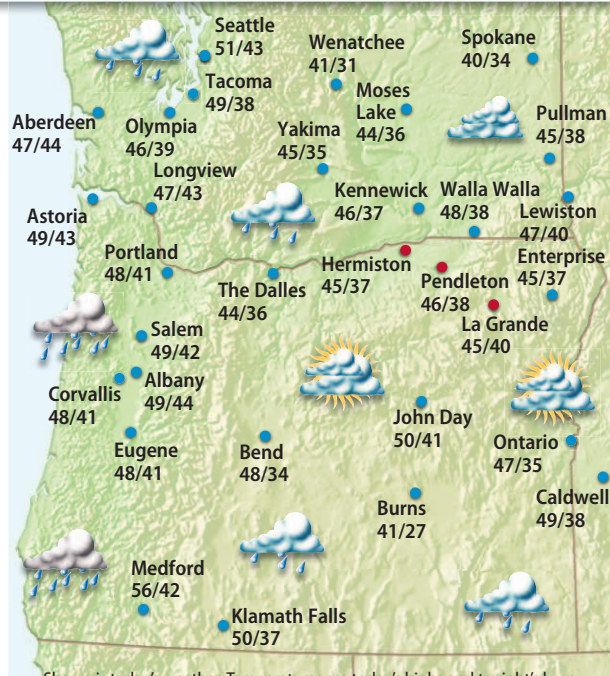

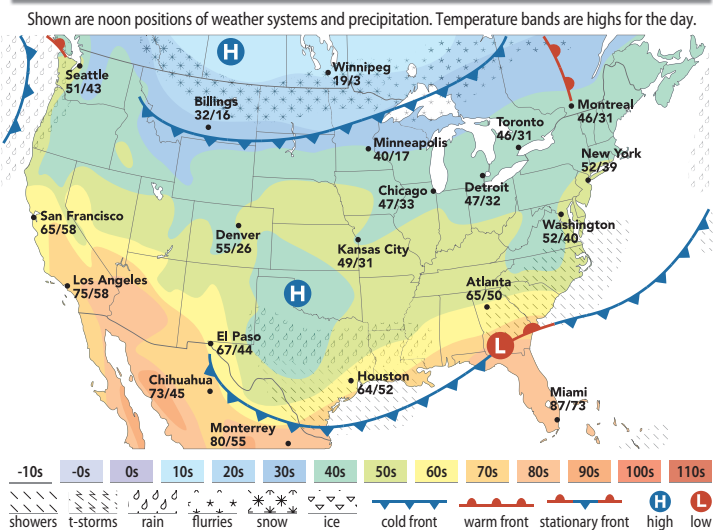

### Ex-mayor violated protocol in chief shooting debacle

PORTLAND (AP) — The former mayor of Portland ignored protocol for police-involved shootings last year when then-Chief Larry O'Dea shot a friend on a Harney County camping trip.

The city's Independent Police Review released a report Monday that calls then-Mayor Charlie Hales' actions an organizational failure that angered the rank-and-file officers.

O'Dea first revealed the off-duty shooting four days after it occurred in a phone call to the mayor and in a meeting with his assistants.

The rules require an immediate internal investigation after an officer-involved shooting.

Hales did not immediately place O'Dea on leave and let Harney County deputies investigate.

But O'Dea had told those deputies his friend accidentally shot himself.

O'Dea retired last year under criminal investigation.

A charge of negligent wounding was dismissed in a deal with Harney County prosecutors.

### Police seize 500 marijuana plants at warehouse

PORTLAND (AP) — Portland police acting on a tip discovered 16 people working in a marijuana-processing warehouse that investigators believe to be illegal.

Sgt. Chris Burley said Tuesday that documents provided to investigators showed the marijuana was being grown for several patients under the Oregon Medical Marijuana Program.

Burley says program guidelines would allow the operation to have up to 30 mature plants. Officers seized 500 plants weighing a total of 3,000 pounds.

### Oregon constitution restored, showcased at archives building

SALEM (AP) — Oregon's original State Constitution has been restored after more than 137

years of wear and a mix-up in page numbers.

The Statesman Journal reports that the restored constitution was unveiled on Monday. It had pages falling apart, fading ink, a torn cover and a peculiar page mix-up.

When it was first bound in 1880 — 23 years after being written — the constitution's 52nd page was put in front of the 51st. That mistake was identified and fixed during a monthlong restoration process earlier this year.

State Archivist Mary Beth Herkert said the original document was "well-loved."

The restored constitution was placed beneath museum-quality glass in the Oregon State Archives building.

It's opened to the preamble, with digital before and after photographs showing the restoration results.

### Parrot's screams for help prompt call to 911

CLACKAMAS (AP) — A UPS deliveryman in Oregon who heard a woman's screams for help had his wife call 911, but when a deputy showed up it turned out the screamer was a parrot, not a woman.

The Oregonian/OregonLive reported Tuesday that when

Clackamas County Sheriff's Deputy Hayden Sanders showed up, all he found was Diego the parrot.

The green-and-yellow bird was in good health and no humans were involved.

### Man shot and killed near Portland State University

PORTLAND (AP) — Homicide detectives are investigating a fatal shooting near Portland State University.

Portland police Sgt. Chris Burley says gunfire was reported shortly before 1 a.m. Tuesday and officers from the city and university found the dying man in front of a Subway restaurant near the South Park Blocks.

Burley says officers provided aid, but the man was dead by the time paramedics arrived.

Witnesses told investigators they saw several people running from the scene after hearing gunfire.

Officers searched the southwest Portland neighborhood, but couldn't find the suspect.

Burley says evidence of gunfire was found near the fast-food restaurant, which was closed when the shooting occurred.

An autopsy is planned.

## Man admits stealing wedding ring from dead stabbing victim on train

PORTLAND (AP) — A homeless man has admitted that he stole a wedding ring off the finger of a man who was stabbed to death in May on a Portland light-rail train. Authorities say the suspect in the killing also killed another man and wounded a third.

The homeless man, George Elwood Tschaggeny, 51, pleaded guilty Monday to theft, identity theft and tampering with physical evidence, court records said.

His plea petition involving the theft from stabbing victim Ricky Best indicated Tschaggeny is expected to receive a punishment of 13 months in prison at his sentencing on Nov. 14.

"I unlawfully and knowingly stole personal property from Ricky Best during a catastrophe," Tschaggeny wrote in the plea agreement.

Tschaggeny was wearing Best's ring when officers arrested him about a week after the stabbings that stunned Oregon's largest city. Investigators said he also stole Best's

wallet and used his credit card five times. Tschaggeny said in court papers that he charged items at grocery and sporting goods stores.

Best was one of three passengers stabbed on May 26 during a confrontation that started when a rider yelled at two black girls, one of whom was wearing an Islamic head covering called a hijab.

Best died on the train, and another victim died at a hospital. The other man survived.

Amid the mayhem on the train, authorities said, Tschaggeny removed the ring from Best's finger and stole his backpack. Police said the theft was caught on surveillance video.

Tschaggeny in 2010 was awarded a civilian medal by Portland police after he helped stop an armed bank robber.

At some point after that he got addicted to painkillers and ended up homeless, his relatives told KOIN-TV and The Oregonian/OregonLive.
