Having exposed Pendleton High School students to local career fields, the Schools to Careers program is ready to put them to work.

A partnership between Eastern Oregon Business Source, Umatilla County, the Pendleton School District and other organizations, Schools to Careers gathered about 30 people from several employers at Pendleton City Hall Monday to introduce them to the Employee Pipeline Project. 
