## Talbot resigns as boys soccer coach

After five seasons leading the Pendleton varsity boys soccer team, Jeremy Talbot is stepping

The Buckaroo coach recently submitted his resignation to the Pendleton school board, who will vote on it at its meeting on Dec. 5. Talbot said on Friday that he was motivated to resign as he and his wife are going through the process of expanding their family and would likely not be able to devote the amount of time needed to coaching the team.

However, he still plans on

volunteering in a lesser role within the Pendleton soccer program and will remain a volunteer with Pendleton Youth Soccer Association and the Parks and Recreation leagues.

Pendleton athletic director Troy Jerome said that the search for a new coach is in a bit of a holding pattern at the moment. The school would prefer the new coach to also be a teacher within the district to "see the kids and work with the kids every day,' Jerome said, but added it was not yet known at this time what

### Yankees pick Boone as manager

NEW YORK (AP) — Multiple media outlets report that the New York Yankees have picked ESPN broadcaster Aaron Boone to succeed Joe Girardi as manager.

The decision was first reported by former New York Daily News columnist Bill

Madden.

Now 44, Boone has never been a manager or even a coach at any level since retiring as a player after the 2009 season. His 11th-inning home run off Boston's Tim Wakefield won Game 7 of the AL Championship Series for the
