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Governor office: Zinke to reconsider drilling off Oregon

SALEM (AP) Interior Secretary Ryan Zinke agreed to consider exempting Oregon from the Trump administration's offshore drilling plan after speaking with Oregon Gov. Kate Brown, her office said Friday.

Brown previously criticized Zinke for the plan to resume drilling for oil and gas off the shores of the United States, saying it would endanger Oregon's coast.

Several other states have objected, but so far Florida has been the only one to receive an exemption after its Republican governor

spokeswoman Zinke Heather Swift said Friday his office would provide no further information about the conversation with Brown.

The Interior Department said earlier in the day that Zinke had set up calls with the governors of Rhode Island, Oregon, California, Washington, Delaware and North Carolina to get their input.

Zinke and Brown, a Democrat, spoke for 28 minutes, said her spokesman, Bryan Hockaday.

Regarding the offshore drilling ban, Gov. Brown asked for the same consideration for Oregon's 'people's coast' as was given Florida," Hockaday said. "Secretary Zinke agreed with concerns about the economic risks that offshore drilling could bring to Oregon and committed to





work with the governor."

Brown, in an interview with CNN earlier this week, noted that Oregon's 362-mile coastline has been publicly accessible for more than 100 years and is important to the state's economy, with 22,000 jobs on the coast.

"We are outraged; this is unacceptable," absolutely she said of the drilling plan. "There has been no drilling off the Pacific Coast for three decades.'


The governors of Caliand Washington fornia have also told Interior they strongly oppose any new leasing off their coasts and asked to be removed from the plan.

Washington state Gov. Jay Inslee said he spoke Friday with Zinke and reiterated his opposition to the offshore oil drilling proposal.

"I told him the concerns of Washingtonians and West Coast residents deserve (to) be treated with the same consideration and deliberation as those in Florida," Inslee said in a statement. "Secretary Zinke did not provide that commitment,

Williams has 'significant concerns' about state's regulation of pot

U.S. Attorney for Oregon Billy Williams has says he "significant concerns' about the state's ability to tamp down on illegal marijuana activity.

Williams, through an op-ed in The Oregonian Friday, offered a detailed perspective on Oregon's marijuana landscape for the first time since Attorney General Jeff Sessions rescinded Obama-era DOJ policies on the drug last week and gave local prosecutors discretion to pursue cases within the state-regulated industry.

It's not a favorable view: Williams was blunt about what he called Oregon's "massive marijuana overproduction problem.'

Sixteen states have reported seizures of marijuana from Oregon, and federal agents and port police have seized more than \$1 million in cash connected with marijuana transactions through the Portland airport in the last six months, Williams said. And postal agents seized 2,644 pounds of marijuana in outbound mail

and more than \$1.2 million in cash in 2017.

Williams, through a spokesman, declined a request for an interview with the EO/Pamplin Capital Bureau.

But in his op-ed Williams said that he wants to host a summit among law enforcement and other groups to share information about the state's problems to "inform our federal enforcement strategy."

Williams claims that producers can sell marijuana illegally for more money in other states, and the profit incentive drives more criminal activity in Oregon.

"This lucrative supply attracts cartels and other criminal networks into Oregon and in turn brings money laundering, and environviolence, mental degradation," Williams wrote.

Williams also criticized a lack of information from the state, in particular an incomplete report from Oregon State Police on a

slew of marijuana-related public safety topics.

A draft version of that report obtained by *The* Oregonian in March. detailed significant problems with the state's regulatory system, "leakage" of Oregon marijuana into the illicit market and diversion

OSP was adamant the draft was incomplete. But nearly a year later, it still hasn't been finished.

A spokesman for OSP did not respond to an inquiry regarding Williams' comments.

Meanwhile, the OSP analyst working on the report has since left the agency for the Oregon-Idaho High Intensity Drug Trafficking Area, a program that supports "collaborative drug control efforts" among law enforcement agencies in the two states.

Chris Gibson. **HIDTA** Oregon-Idaho executive director, said that he hoped the report would be done by the end of 2018.
