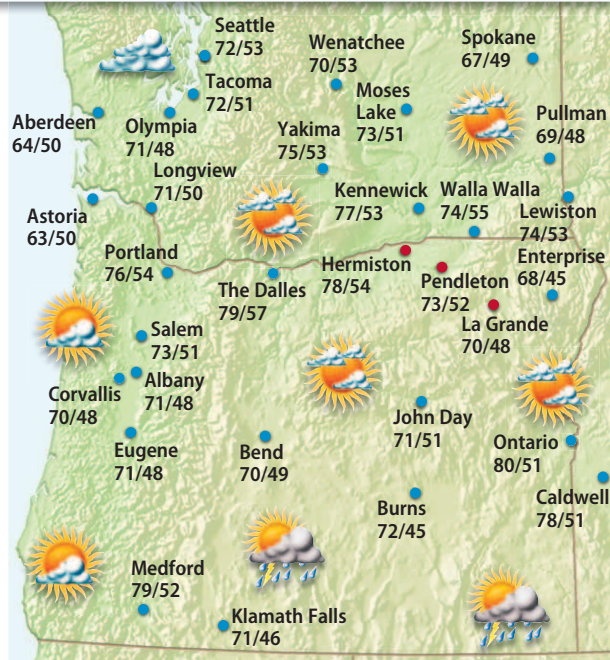

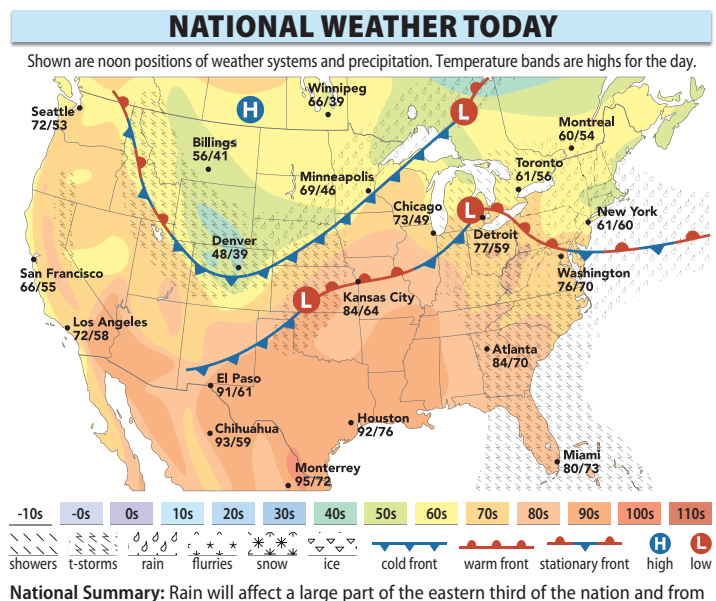

Man throws wallet at Stormy Daniels at Oregon strip club

BEND (AP) — Adult film actress Stormy Daniels was forced to cut short a performance at an Oregon strip club after a man threw a wallet at her face.

More than 100 people were at the Stars Cabaret on Thursday to see Daniels as part of her tour across the country, the Bend Bulletin reported.

Daniels, whose real name is Stephanie Clifford, was in the middle of a strip performance to Lenny Kravitz's cover of "American Woman" when an apparently intoxicated man threw the wallet at her.

Police arrived at the bar and interviewed the man outside. The man told police that he was "wasted" and he was "extremely sorry" for what he did, the report said.

Daniels declined to press charges, police said.

Daniels made national headlines after she revealed she was paid \$130,000 to keep quiet about claims she had sex with President Donald Trump in 2006. Trump has acknowledged reimbursing his lawyer for the payment to Daniels but denies her allegations.

The strip club in Bend, Oregon, promoted Daniels' appearance on Thursday as a chance to see history in person.

It charged \$20 for admission and an additional \$15 to \$25 for seats

closer to the stage. People from across the political spectrum attended the show.

One man wore a hat that read "Make America Great Again" while another man wore a T-shirt that read "Elect a Clown, get a circus."

Katya Toporkova, 29, arrived early with friends Emily Juno, 24, and Holly Landrum, 25. The women, who are all from Bend, said it was an opportunity they couldn't pass up.

Daniels held a meet-and-greet for fans before the performance, where she charged \$20 for a photo.

Daniels has stops in Salem on Friday and Tualatin on Saturday.

Brown plans to address property tax system

PORTLAND — Gov. Kate Brown says she plans to work with state lawmakers in 2019 to craft a ballot referral to reform the state's property tax system.

Brown made the comment during a Q&A at the Portland City Club's Friday Forum at the Sentinel Hotel in downtown Friday, May 18, in answer to a question from former Portland Commissioner Steve Novick.

"The taxes we pay are based largely on what a house was worth in 1995 rather than what it's worth today," Novick said. "That means the people in recently gentrified areas, like inner East Portland, are paying low property taxes, whereas people in un-gentrified areas, like far East Portland, are paying high property taxes. Are you planning to work with Sen. Hass in 2019 to craft a measure to send to the voters to address this inequity?"

Brown responded that while voters need some education on how the property tax system works, she "would love to have the ongoing property tax conversation in the state again."

Sen. Mark Hass, D-Beaverton, chairman of the Senate Finance and Revenue Committee, proposed addressing the property tax system in bills filed in 2015 and 2017. He said he is

uncertain whether he'll propose a third iteration of the legislation in 2019.

To date, Brown has placed other priorities over property tax reform and other problematic areas in the state tax code, Hass said.

She has called a special session for May 21 to expand a business tax break, after she received heat for signing a bill earlier this year that denied Oregon businesses a 20-percent tax break written

much bigger problem."

The state property tax system, for instance, is in a state of collapse, Hass said.

"When you have someone who pays twice what their neighbor pays for the same house and that person says, 'This isn't fair I'm not paying it,' it's something that happens in third-world countries, but I'd like to think it's not something that happens in Oregon."

Voters must ultimately vote to change the property tax code, as it was written into the Oregon Constitution.

Measure 50, approved in 1997, enacted a permanent operating rate limit for all existing tax districts.

The rate was calculated largely by combining existing local tax levies. The tax rates cannot be changed by any action of the tax district and have remained stagnant since 1997, despite a burgeoning state economy in the past couple of years.

The complexity of the state's tax system is one of the challenges to passing a voter referendum to reform it, lending credence to the governor's assertion that voters need more education before taking a vote.

One option is to propose a referral that simply asks voters whether they want an equitable tax system, Hass said. If voters affirm that, then the state courts and the Legislature could pass policies to reform it.
