ARREST: Ahumada had a felony parole violation warrant

Police Chief Jason Edmiston said Thursday morning Ahumada is no longer a person of interest — he's officially a suspect.

"Ahumada did not want to talk to us, which is fine," Edmiston said, because his department will compile the case evidence and reports for prosecutors to charge Ahumada.

The moves that led to the capture began after an anonymous caller at 2:49 p.m. told the Boardman Police Department that Ahumada was at the residence at 70072 Kunze Lane, just outside the Boardman city limits, according to a written statement from the Morrow County Sheriff's Office. Boardman police immediately alerted the sheriff's office because the location was in county jurisdiction. The sheriff's office in turn told Hermiston police, according to Edmiston.

The sheriff's office reported it confirmed Ahumada "was barricaded inside the residence at the Kunze Lane address." Edmiston said Morrow County law

enforcement arrived first and secured the area, and Hermiston police at about 4 p.m. sent its two general detectives, the drug task force detective and Randy Studebaker, the investigative lieutenant.

Edmiston said Ahumada had a felony parole violation warrant and 15 arrests and 43 citations to his name.

And he was not alone in the residence. The sheriff's office therefore asked Oregon State Police to send its SWAT team to help.

Lt. Mike Turner, commander of state police out of Pendleton, said about 20 team members responded. The team is statewide, he said, with troopers in Pendleton, La Grande and elsewhere, and coordinated with the Morrow County Sheriff's Office and Hermiston police.

"We can call on them, and they respond without ques-

tion and are always willing to assist," he said.

SWAT team members started to arrive around 6:15 p.m. and trickled in over the course of several hours.

Ahumada was in a stand-off with police for four hours, the sheriff's office reported, before the SWAT team arrested him.

Turner said he did not want to talk about the tactics the team used, but Ahumada came out on his own. Edmiston said the team was there to ensure the safety of everyone involved.

State police booked Ahumada into the Umatilla County Jail, Pendleton, a little after midnight Thursday, but police remained at the Boardman home until almost 3 a.m.

Edmiston said the Umatilla County District Attorney's Office should get the case by Friday morning.

TAX: Most of the campaign funding came from national retailers

foods — support started to waver. Some of those products might be viewed as more of a luxury."

Katherine Dreissen, spokeswoman for Our Oregon, a labor-backed social justice political group, said the measure is an attempt by major retailers to prevent lawmakers from passing a gross receipts tax. Our Oregon campaigned for a gross receipts tax in 2016, which voters rejected, but lawmakers have since discussed passing a more moderate tax to help raise revenue for schools and social services.

The measure also

would prevent a tax on sugary drinks, something being considered in Multnomah County.

Dreissen said the initiative isn't aimed at protecting consumers. "It's about padding the pockets of Walmart, Safeway and other big retailers that have already spent more than \$2 million to qualify this measure," she said.

Most of the \$1.9 million the campaign has raised this year came from major national retailers, such as Kroger, the parent company of Fred Meyer; Costco and Albertsons, which merged with Safeway in 2018.

While the campaign for the initiative claims restaurant food could still be

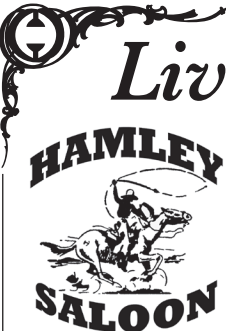
taxed, the Oregon Attorney General's Office has indicated only restaurant taxes that already exist — such as those passed in Ashland and Yachats — would still be allowed under the initiative.

The initiative is similar to one the campaign helped to pass in St. Helens May 15 with 89 percent of the vote. That initiative amended the city charter to ban grocery taxes and started after the City Council started discussing a tax on sugar-sweetened beverages.
