100 Years Ago

May 30, 1918

Of interest to farmers will be the wage scale fixed by about 50 farmers and business men of Echo at a meeting held in the city hall there last night. It was decided to pay \$3 and \$4, according to the kind of work, on the first crop of hay, while wages for the second crop will be governed by the wheat laborers' pay. The wheat farmers will pay a graded wage from \$3.50 and \$5 to \$10. It is expected that there will be a scarcity of laborers as few men have appeared asking for work as yet.

50 Years Ago

A handbell, such as one on many teachers' desks in by-gone days, was rung by Gaylord Salter Sunday afternoon to quiet the assembly gathered to honor Sigrid Wolhowe, retiring after 31 years as first grade teacher in the Athena school system. Thirty-six years ago Bob Chambers got his start as a rodeo announcer at the Livestock Show and Rodeo in Union. He's returned every year, and will be there again in two weeks. But this time will be his last. "I've done everything a guy could hope for" as a rodeo announcer, said Chambers, who has been busy this week announcing the College Northwest Regional Finals at the Hermiston fairgrounds. "But when I put down the microphone at Union I'm calling it quits. I started there, so I figure it would be appropriate to finish up there." Since becoming a full-time announcer, Chambers has done 25-40 rodeos a year, which boiled down to 76 performances in 1992. "I owe myself a few years" to do as he and his wife, Phyllis, please, he said.

THIS DAY IN HISTORY

On May 30, 1958, unidentified American service members killed in World War II and the Korean War were interred in the Tomb of the Unknowns at Arlington National Cemetery.

In 1381, the Peasants' Revolt against economic injustice erupted in England during the reign of King Richard II; the king and his men, initially caught off-guard, were able to crush the rebellion several weeks later.

In 1431, Joan of Arc, condemned as a heretic, was burned at the stake in Rouen, France.

In 1536, England's King Henry VIII married his third wife, Jane Seymour, 11 days after the king's second wife, Anne Boleyn, was beheaded for treason and adultery.

In 1883, 12 people were trampled to death in a stampede sparked by a rumor that the recently opened Brooklyn Bridge was in danger of collapsing.

In 1911, the first Indy

500 took place at the Indianapolis Motor Speedway; the winner was Ray Harroun, who drove a Marmon Wasp for more than 6 1/2 hours at an average speed of 74.6 mph and collected a prize of \$10,000.

In 1922, the Lincoln Memorial in Washington, D.C. was dedicated in a ceremony attended by President Warren G. Harding, Chief Justice William Howard Taft and Robert Todd Lincoln.

In 1937, ten people were killed when police fired on steelworkers demonstrating near the Republic Steel plant in South Chicago.

In 1943, during World War II, American troops secured the Aleutian island of Attu from Japanese forces.

In 1971, the American space probe Mariner 9 blasted off from Cape Kennedy on a journey to Mars.

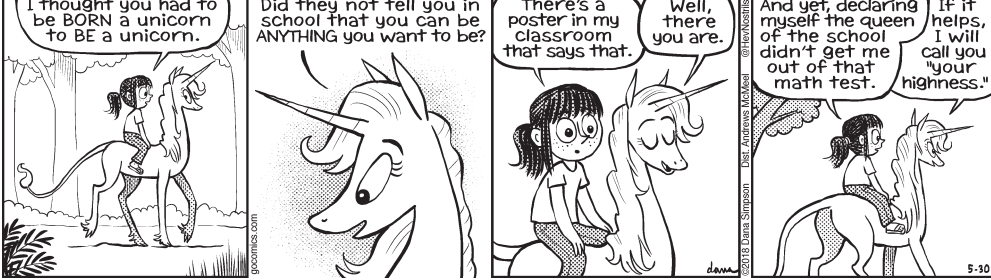
