A celebration to honor the life of David Gregory Dallas will be held Saturday, June 9, 2018, at Dallas Ranch. At 2 p.m., Reverend Charlotte Wells and Deacon Jean Cupp will officiate at a service of Thanksgiving, followed by food and remembrance until 5 p.m. at the ranch's shop.

Dave was born in Pendleton on April 2, 1953, to Elaine Moeller and Charles Dallas. He was the oldest of three children. His sister Terry Dallas, and her husband Doug DeBok, live in Pendleton. His sister Karen Anderson, and her husband Terry Anderson, live in Grand Junction, Colo. His parents preceded Dave in death. He is survived by his wife, Shari, his daughter Kari Dallas, and her husband Andy Spratling, Pendleton; his daughter Gregory Dallas, Portland; his son David Dallas, and his husband Scott Vignos, Corvallis; his son Joseph Dallas, and his wife Yandi Dallas, Portland; and grandchildren Charlie and Dolly Elaine Spratling.

Dave was a proud graduate of Hawthorne Elementary School, Pendleton High School, and Oregon State University, where he was a member of Sigma Nu fraternity and earned a degree in ag economics.

Farming was the only thing Dave ever wanted to do; he felt privileged to begin his career as a wheat grower after college with his greatest hero, his dad. When his dad died, Dave and long-time collaborator Bill Boyd spent the next nearly 30 years acquiring new ground, fabricating and maintaining equipment, mapping out each year's successful farm plan, and caring for what is known as some of the cleanest ground in Umatilla County. Last summer, Dave figured he had — counting the years he could “just see over the steering wheel” to relieve his dad on the combine — about 55 harvests under his belt. He hoped to be a part of putting this summer's crop “in the bin,” but he felt confident Bill, along with co-stewards on the ranch, Bruce Purcell and Kent Bigsby, would help oversee another successful harvest.

Dave also had great confidence in his children's ability to make a difference in the world. He patiently and appreciatively answered a kajillion questions over the

years about how the world works and supported not a few great universities as Kari, Gregory, Davy and Joey pursued their dreams. His love for them was unconditional, and he was proud to see in each of them a work ethic and determination that matched his own.

It was, in fact, people trying as hard as they could to do their jobs well that he most admired. It was Richard Mayer, who could manufacture any part known to man; Betty and Connie, who kept the Rainbow's coffee hour flowing, year in and year out; John Leonard, who arrived at the shop each winter and had the skill to keep combines up and running; and Bill Schuck, who doggedly tracked down even the most obscure part for machinery that was supposed to be obsolete.

Dave felt happy about some of the fortunate adventures he had had over the years. The best were with a circle of friends who were all fellow Master Divers and instructors of scuba diving. From Dave's favorite, Costa Rica, to Bonaire, to Little Cayman, he was mesmerized by the technical aspects of diving and the otherworldliness at 80 feet. He shared this love with all four of his children, each of whom became certified divers in their teens.

Dave's happiest adventures, though, have been in recent years, as “Papa” to Charlie and Dolly. With co-captain Charlie keeping him company in the gravel truck or heading to McKennon for seed, and little Dolly, with her wide grin, ready to give him her specialty smooch, he felt himself a lucky man.

Dave died at his home Thursday morning, May 24, after a several-month struggle with pancreatic cancer. He and his family were grateful for the skilled care and great compassion of the medical staff at both St. Anthony and St. Mary's hospitals.
