12:08 p.m. - The East Umatilla County Rural Fire Protection District and Helix Fire responded to a grass fire on Lieuallen Road outside Weston. The fire went into the cheat grass and land in the Conservation Reserve Program, then climbed the hill into a wheat field.

Weston's public works staff cut a line with a front-end loader, which laid the greener wheat down and stopped the fire from spreading. East Umatilla had nine firefighters with two brush trucks and a tender on the initial attack. Assistance came from Pendleton Fire, Umatilla Tribal Fire, the Oregon Department of Forestry, and the Bureau of Indian Affairs. East Umatilla Chief Dave Baty thanked the other agencies.

"This fire had the potential to take off and burn, but we had enough help to stop it," he said.

The fire burned three acres and the cause remains under investigation.

Marion E. Beck

Marion E. Beck, formerly of Milton-Freewater, passed away on June 10, 2018, at the Walla Walla Veterans Home at the age of 96 years.

Marion Edward Beck was born on September 27, 1921, in Mabton, Wash., to Chester and Bernice. The third of four children, Marion spent his childhood in Bickleton, Wash., Pilot Rock, Ore., and Ione, Ore., before his family settled in Hermiston where he graduated high school in 1940.

In April 1943, Marion entered the service under wartime draft and served with the 186th Infantry 41st Division under the Oregon National Guard. He served in the Philippines and then went to Japan for occupation until his discharge in 1946. During his service he earned the Bronze Service Arrowhead, Philippine Liberation Medal with two Bronze Stars, Asiatic Pacific Service Medal, Victory Medal, and Good Conduct Medal.

Upon his discharge, Marion began his career as a mechanic, eventually working on agricultural equipment and large trucks with Dayl Graves until his retirement in 1981. In 1948, Marion met and married his one love, Elsie. While they did not have children together, he helped her raise her two sons, a granddaughter, and a great-granddaughter.

In 1953, they moved to Milton-Freewater where they would live out the rest of their lives together until Elsie's passing in 2005. Even though they both held jobs in town, they loved

to farm and ranch, owning many horses and maintaining a U-pick strawberry patch until 1990.

They both loved road trips, and over the course of their years together would travel to national parks and scenic areas. In their twilight years, they enjoyed road trips to Las Vegas to enjoy their love of gambling together.

Marion was proud to be a descendant of those that helped organize the Pendleton

Round-Up at its conception in 1910 and would always be sure to attend the rodeo circuit as much as possible every year. Marion continued to live in Milton-Freewater until 2015, enjoying weekly trips to Wildhorse Casino and the rodeo circuit with his great-granddaughter Amy, who took care of him after his health began failing.

Marion is survived by four grandchildren, six great-grandchildren, and two great-great-grandchildren.

Graveside services will be held at the Milton Freewater Cemetery on Tuesday, June 19, at 1 p.m. Flowers may be sent to Munselle-Rhodes Funeral Home 902 S. Main, Milton-Freewater, Oregon. Those who would like to attend services are requested to wear blue rather than black.

Fewer U.S. teens smoking, doing drugs ... and drinking milk

NEW YORK — Fewer U.S. teens are smoking, having sex and doing drugs these days. Oh, and they're drinking less milk, too.

Less than one-third of high school students drink a glass of milk a day, according to a large government survey released Thursday. About two decades ago, it was nearly half.

Last year's survey asked about 100 questions on a wide range of health topics, including smoking, drugs and diet. Researchers compared the results to similar questionnaires going back more than 25 years.

One trend that stood out was the drop in drinking milk, which started falling for all Americans after World War II. In recent decades, teens have shifted from milk to soda, then to Gatorade and other sports drinks and recently to energy drinks like Monster and Red Bull.

The survey showed slightly fewer kids are drinking soda and sports drinks now, compared to the last survey in 2015.

One caveat: Most students were not asked about energy drinks so

how many kids drink them now isn't known. A study from a decade ago estimated that nearly a third of kids between the age of 12 and 17 were regularly drinking energy drinks.

Kids have shifted from a dairy product rich in calcium and vitamin D to beverages laden with sugar and caffeine, which is likely contributing to the nation's obesity problem, said Barry Popkin, a University of North Carolina researcher who studies how diets change.

"This is not a healthy trend for our long-term health," he said.

For teens, the government recommends 3 cups daily of dairy products — milk, yogurt or cheese.

The survey by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention is conducted every two years. About 15,000 students at 144 high schools were surveyed last year. The surveys are anonymous and voluntary, and there's no check of medical records or other documents to verify answers.
