In 2018 he was inducted into PHS Sports Hall of Fame for his athletic contributions during his high school career.

After high school JD chose to serve his country and enlisted in the United States Army in 2003. He served in the 25th Infantry Division, 1st Battalion, 27th Infantry Regiment "Wolf-hounds," where he was stationed at Schofield Barracks in Hawaii. JD was a combat veteran of operation Iraqi Freedom/Second Gulf War where he deployed in 2004.

It was after high school that he also met the love of his life and future wife Lindsey, marrying in 2003 before he joined the army. In 2005 their son Payton was born, followed by their daughter Tatum in 2008. JD absolutely adored his children and, to anyone who knew him, it was obvious they were his pride and joy. He was quite involved in athletics as a young man. He played on Echo's undefeated 1953 state championship basketball team and the 1955 state championship baseball team. He was captain of the 1956 basketball team, which finished second in state.

Mick enjoyed stopping to interact with any babies he might see. His love of children directed him toward a career in education. He received BS and MS degrees in education at Eastern Oregon College (now University) before continuing graduate work at the University of Oregon, where he received his educational administrative credential.

Although jobs were plentiful throughout the state in 1960, Mick wanted to remain close to home because his father was ill. Thus began his long association with the Morrow County School District, where he served for 34 years. He accepted a contract to teach sixth grade at A.C. Houghton School in Irrigon for the sum of \$4,500, the highest base salary of all Eastern Oregon College education grads in that year. He received an additional \$200 to coach a total of four sports: junior high football, basketball, baseball and track. (Was this the beginning of merit pay?) After teaching for three years, his principal left. He was encouraged by the local advisory committee, as well as the Morrow County School Board, to apply for the position. Refusing to do so at first, he finally succumbed to encouragement from others, and signed a one-year contract at the age of 24. He grave credit to Joyce Smith, a longtime staff member, for mothering him through the hot spots of that first year. The one-year trial

After retirement he spent some time supervising stu-

dent teachers for Eastern Oregon and Portland State universities. He especially enjoyed some time in the classroom when called upon to be a substitute teacher. In 1966 Mick

Mick was active in numerous professionals and civic organizations over the years, including charter membership in North Morrow Vector Control, Columbia View Community Church and the OESPA (state elementary principals' organization). He especially enjoyed traveling and meeting new people, and was fortunate to have visited 54 countries with his wife, Susan, before Parkinson's disease brought an end to traveling adventures.

Tolar is survived by his wife of 37 years; sons Patrick Gray Tolar (Tera) and Aaron Jon Tolar; daughter Megan Lynn Bryan; six grandchildren: Breena Renae Tolar Beck (Travis), Brooke Renee Tolar, Katelyn Marie Tolar, Zack Loyal Bryan, Cade Gray Bryan and Mya Lan Bryan; and brothers Joseph Ray Tolar (Kathy) and Robert Lynn Tolar (Maria).

Mick was preceded in death by his parents, and his sisters Vera Louise Gurtler and Mary Ruth Colburn.

He shared a love of pheasant, chukar and duck hunting with his son-in-law Jon and special friend Ron Hellman. Occasionally he chose his photography skills over his hunting skills and would come home from a hunting trip with only photographs.

Growing up on the California coast he developed a great love of fishing he shared with his dad. As a little boy, he was known to occasionally skip school and take his dad's boat out fishing. He shared his love of fishing with his daughters and took them frequently to Bully Creek, Brownlee, and Owyhee reservoirs. His daughters sometimes preferred swimming over fishing on these trips. He learned to accept he may not come home with a catch because of the splashing they

created by disturbing the fish. Joel had a love for gardening and would spend each summer growing two abundant gardens. He especially enjoyed growing tomatoes and corn, which he generously shared with friends, family and neighbors. He loved bright colorful flowers and planted zinnias yearly. He had a soft spot for animais, and especially loved cats and his daughters'

grandkitties. Joel and Trish moved to Hermiston, Oregon, in 2017 to be closer to their kids in his later years. He had a special nostalgia for the redwoods and enjoyed visiting his childhood home on the Northern California coast, but his heart always remained in Vale and the Treasure Valley.


Elmer was an avid rockhound and hiked many miles in the hills searching for all kinds of rock. Petrified wood was his favorite. He spent countless hours
