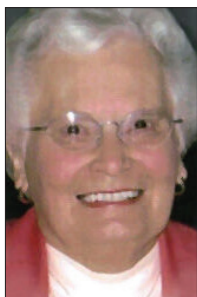
all over the state for games, rodeos, and other events over the years. She was an avid sports fan, cheering on her favorite teams daily.

Jerold Duane Dillavou, 89, was born Aug. 23, 1931, in Jefferson, Iowa, to Max and Bessie Dillavou. He passed June 27 with his family around him.

He grew up in Ralston, Iowa. In 1945, they moved to Bly, Oregon, to join family. He graduated high school in Bly and in 1951 he joined the Air Force. In four years, he worked his way up to be the youngest ever staff sergeant. His career was spent working on B-36 airplanes.

He married his high school sweetheart, Darlene Hadley, on March 15, 1953. They lived in El Paso, Texas, until he was honorably discharged in 1955, and moved back to Bly. Their son, Gary, was born in 1957. They lived on Gerber Ranch for 12 years where Darlene cooked for the ranch hands. Jerry worked at the lumber mill in Bly and worked his way up to superintendent.

In 1980, he and Darlene moved to Sabah, Malaysia, to build and manage a saw mill for Weyerhaeuser. He and Darlene made a good life in a tiny lumber camp, Silam, in the middle of the jungle and were loved and respected by everyone. They belonged to the Anglican church in Laha Datu and made many friends in the community. Their amah (maid), Violeta Limod, was like a daughter to them, and on their return to the U.S. she came with them. They traveled extensively in Asia, Jerry making many trips to Japan and other countries to negotiate for equipment.

In 1986 they moved to North Bend, Washington, working as a plywood manager for Weyerhaeuser. In 1989 he worked at the mill in Raymond, Washington, as project manager, and retired in 1995. He moved to Pendleton, Oregon, in 1996 to be close to family.

His grandchildren were the light of his life. He and Darlene loved to take care

of them and took them on many adventures. They were very involved in all their school and athletic events. They loved him — he was their Papa.

He belonged to the Masonic temple for over 50 years and was a past master. His passion was golfing, and he was a member of the Echo Hills Golf Club and golfed until he was 85 with his best friend, Pat Davis. He especially enjoyed traveling to Mexico with family and friends to golf. He loved to fish and hunt deer and elk with his hunting buddies. He was a member of the Free Methodist Church. He was involved in church and community events wherever they lived, and helped anyone in need. He loved to tell stories and could entertain folks for hours and get tickled again at his own stories.

He was preceded in death by his parents, his brothers Jack, Rex and Mike, and his sister Shirley. He is survived by his loving wife, Darlene of Pendleton; son Gary (Linda) of Pendleton; grandson Shane (Rachael) of La Grande, Oregon; twin granddaughters Katie and Nicole of Boise, Idaho; great-grandson Kellen; many nieces and nephews who call him their Uncle Pill, and he meant the world to them; and his little poodle and constant companion, Cinder.

Ryan was born on Sept. 20, 1984, to DeeDee (Lenhart) Jones and Ray Telford. He was an avid fisherman, and frequently fished McKay Creek, the Columbia and Umatilla rivers, Wallowa Lake and many other Oregon and Washington lakes and rivers. He also enjoyed gardening and farming on the family wheat farm. Ryan loved to travel and visited several countries, including Israel, Jordan, Germany, Switzerland and China.

Ryan helped his mother DeeDee for 10 years at Pendleton Good Samaritan Ministries, where he often shared his life story with clients and those seeking counseling. He also had a big heart for his family and helped take care of his grandmother Wanda Telford. Some of Ryan's fondest memories were from his time in the West Bank serving handicapped children at Rose of Jerusalem. He also assisted on a medical mission trip to Haiti with his mother and sister Sherry.

Boyd D. Sharp

Boyd D. Sharp of Umatilla was born Feb. 22, 1936, in Grand Coulee, Washington, the son of Edward and Hallie (Bower) Sharp. He passed away in Hermiston, Oregon, on Tuesday, June 29, 2021, at the age of 85.

Boyd travelled extensively throughout the Pacific Northwest throughout his childhood, attending schools in Eastern Washington, Eastern Oregon and Idaho. He married Anne Corrine Turcotte in Spokane, Washington, on June 24, 1956. The couple lived in Spokane, Baker City, Pendleton and Klamath Falls before moving to Umatilla in 2000.

Boyd served in the U.S. Air Force for seven years. He worked as a pastor for the Church of God in Baker City and Spokane. He then attended Whitworth University in Spokane where he received his bachelor's degree in psychology. He continued his education at Oregon State University, where he completed his master's degree.

Boyd worked throughout his career as a drug and alcohol counselor. He started the Baker County Council Alcohol and Drug Program. He later ran a similar program in Pendleton. He worked as a drug and alcohol counselor in correctional facilities in Baker, Umatilla and Klamath counties. He also authored a book, "Changing Criminal Thinking." He taught college courses on changing criminal thinking for a short time in Klamath Falls.

In 2000, Boyd retired from counseling and moved

to Umatilla, Oregon, where he kept busy serving the community. In Umatilla, he was involved with Landing Days, volunteered at the library, served on the city council, volunteered for reading programs at Umatilla schools and was active with the museum. He also enjoyed going to Club 24 in Hermiston where he exercised 4 to 5 days a week. He trained so he could walk the Camino de Santiago trail in Europe, which he did three times.

Boyd enjoyed elk hunting in the Granite area and loved spending time in the mountains. He went on several salmon fishing excursions in Canada and he would often take family members on fishing trips.

Boyd was preceded in death by his wife of 61 years, Anne, on Feb. 2, 2018; his parents; and three brothers, Terry, Carroll and Ed.

He is survived by his sons Rocky Sharp and Mike (Jo) Sharp; daughters Deb (Joel) Underwood, Sue Sharp and Barbara (Mark) Lizotte; 13 grandchildren, Cindy, Shane, Rachel, Aaron, Anna, Andrea, Joe, Stephanie, Leah, TJ, Chantal, Josh and Bella; and 14 great-grandchildren.
