

They raised their children to love horses, just the way they did, and the family participated in horse races across the western United States. ing her bingo partners. and often traveled around the Northwest with her daughter Verna to play in big games. She loved to garden, and growing tomatoes and zucchini were her favorite. Videll was a lover of reading and always had a stack of books to share. You could find Videll in the stands at the gym attending basketball games, or other sports to show her love and support.
