'MISS BENSON'S BEETLE' AND THE HERMISTON PUBLIC LIBRARY'S BOOK CLUB

If you've ever had enough of an unfulfilling life and wished to escape, then you might just find a friend in "Miss Benson's Beetle," Rachel Joyce's 2020 novel. I read it at the Hermiston Public Library's book club, Bookminders, a few months ago. I love the book and the book club, and I recommend both.

First, the book...

In "Miss Benson's," a middleaged woman is a disrespected, unappreciated teacher in England. She lives alone. She has never had a true romance, or even experienced adventure. One day, however, she finally has enough. She suddenly leaves her job, walking away from everything to plan a trip to the other side of the world.

Not wanting to go alone, she befriends a second woman, who is strange and has a mysterious past. Together, the pair travel to foreign countries and form a tight


friendship, all the while trying to accomplish their mission — finding a rare beetle, hitherto uncategorized by British entomologists.

I feel a bit guilty for making this book my favorite, because I do not think it was written for me. Much of the novel is about female friendships and women's struggles in a patriarchal society. As a man, I can sympathize and try to understand but I cannot relate. I think, if I were a character in this book, I might even be a villain, even though I would try to be otherwise. Through bumbling or pettiness, I would probably be a foil to the protagonists. This is a bummer.

Still, I love this book for its adventure and its look into exotic cultures and times. I also love its situation. When I wished to start a new life and have adventures, this book was there for me.

Now, let me tell you about my book club, which is also uplifting. There, I meet people I still barely know. Yet we share our thoughts and feelings about life as we also discuss a different
