PENDLETON — What started with 10 men and five horses has grown into an association that honors exemplary men, women and livestock who embody the rich history and heritage that the Pendleton Round-Up and Happy Canyon Hall of Fame prides themselves in protecting.

Since its creation in 1969, the Pendleton Round-Up and Happy Canyon Hall of Fame has inducted new honorees yearly. Each spring, four honorees from the Native American, contestant, volunteer and animal categories are chosen to be inducted.

Voted for by existing Hall of Fame members, the inductees are celebrated at the Round-Up during the inductee banquet and are presented to the arena on the Wednesday of Round-up week. The new Hall of Famers are also given museum display cases that show pictures, memorabilia and other pieces that highlight the honorees' excellence and contribution to the community.
