TO THE PUBLIC.

AS THE U. S. REVENUE LAW, RESPECTING STAMPS, has now been well distributed throughout the State, by circulars and publications, no reason can be given for its violation; therefore this is to notify all persons violating the same, that they will be proceeded against once, and the penalty exacted. The penalties are from ten (10) dollars to one thousand (\$1,000) dollars for every offence, according to the nature of the offence, besides costs of prosecution, making void the instrument, and forfeiture of the goods. Any person knowing the law to be violated by any one will give immediate notice to the Collector or Assessor, or their Deputies and Assistants, and in case of conviction, they will be entitled to receive one-half the penalties.
