LATEST EASTERN NEWS.

Washington, Feb. 22.—The Navy Department has received the following:

U. S. Flag Ship Malvern, Cape Fear River, Feb. 19—I have the honor to report the surrender or evacuation of Fort Anderson. Gen. Schofield advanced from Smithfield with 8,000 men on the 17th. At the same time I attacked the works, by placing the monitor Monadnock close to the Fort, enfilading with the Pawtucket, Senator, Armadillo and Pequod, the wind not allowing more vessels to get under fire. The Fort answered briskly, but quieted down by sunset. On the 18th, at 8 o'clock, I moved up closer, the Monadnock leading, followed by the Haron, McKean, Sasacus; Pontoosuc, Mohahgo, Lenfer, Manila, Pawtucket, Gaceola, Shawmut, Tecumseh, Cylpso and Little Ada. These kept up a heavy fire through the day till late in the afternoon.

The enemy's batteries were silenced by three o'clock, though we kept up a fire till dark. We also fired through the night. In the meantime Schofield was working around to the rear of the rebels to cut them off. The latter did not wait to be surrounded, but left in the night, taking five or six pieces of light artillery with them, and everything else of value. This morning some of our troops who were near by, went in and hoisted a flag on the ramparts, when the firing ceased from the mortars. There were ten heavy guns in Fort Anderson, and a quantity of ammunition. We lost but three killed and five wounded.

Washington, Feb. 22.—The Navy Department has received information that Lieut. Wm. B. Cushing constructed a mock monitor so closely resembling those vessels that no difference could be detected at the distance of one hundred yards. On Saturday night, Feb. 18th, at about ten o'clock, the vessel was taken up to within about four hundred yards of Fort Anderson and set adrift. As there was a strong flood tide, she moved up the river and passed the fort as if under slow steam. At that time the army had worked about two-thirds the distance around and in the rear of the fort. The rebels thinking that their communications were to be cut off by land and water, escaped by the only avenue open to them, leaving their guns unspiked and their magazines uninjured.

Washington, Feb. 22.—The public and many private buildings of Washington are illuminated to night. Every main entrance to the State Department has the following motto: "Peace and good will to all Nations, but no entangling alliances, and no foreign intervention."

Washington, Feb. 22.—Speaking of the evacuation of Columbia, a Richmond paper of the 20th says: It is said that some of our engraved treasury note paper fell into the hands of the Yankees, and also a considerable quantity of medical stores. We have no particulars of these losses, as the official dispatch in regard to the fall of Columbia was communicated to the President. We doubt whether it was ever sent to the War Department which appears to be in complete ignorance of affairs in South Carolina, except from what bits of information have been posted up on the streets.

The same paper says: We understand that Grant shows no disposition to assume offensive operations, and has withdrawn from the forts this side of Hatcher's run. The condition of the roads render the success of any important movement doubtful. The ground is thoroughly thawed and the roads are almost impassable for cavalry and artillery, and exceedingly difficult for the movements of the infantry.

San Francisco, Feb. 24.—The following dispatch was received to-day:

Headquarters, Department of the Pacific, San Francisco, Feb. 24, 1865—Generals Orders No. 11—The following has just been received by telegraph: Washington Feb. 21, 1865—To Major General McDowell—It is ordered that a National salute be fired to-morrow noon, February 22d, at West Point and at every fort in the United States, in honor of the restoration of the flag of the Union upon Fort Sumter. Acknowledge the receipt. By order of the Secretary of War.

(Signed) E. D. TOWNSEND, Asst. Adjt.-General.

As the delay in the receipt of the foregoing does not permit the execution of the order on the date named, the anniversary of Washington's birthday, the salute will be fired at noon from every fort and battery in this harbor and Benicia, but at all other posts in the Department on the day succeeding the receipt hereof. When the salute is fired, the entire command will be paraded under arms, and give three times three cheers for that noble, glorious, sacred old flag of the Union, the Stars and Stripes, now so soon under God's favor to be restored throughout the length and breadth of our land. SOUTH AMERICAN AFFAIRS.

We have been so absorbed in our own political troubles as almost overlook the movements in progress on the rest of this continent. The designs of France against Mexico early attracted our attention, because they were connected with supposed ultimate intentions against the integrity of our own country. But the action of Spain in San Domingo and Peru has not commanded the attention it would otherwise have received, had we been at peace among ourselves. The Monroe doctrine is a principle which has always started into life on the least sign of European interference with the American republics, but the necessity of conquering the rebellion has laid that important political enunciation quietly on the shelf. But if we are compelled to remain quiet spectators merely of affairs in South America, the Southern republics themselves deem European interference so impertinent and dangerous, that they are disposed to form a coalition for their own protection against it.

Chile, Bolivia, the Argentine Republic, and Guatemala have agreed to a convention of plenipotentiaries from their different States, to act in concert with Peru, for the purpose of common united action against Spain. They feel that their own independence is compromised, or in danger, so long as one is liable to European domination; and it is quite probable that if Spain persists in pushing her claims to the Peruvian Islands, she will be involved in a war with all these South American powers. Spain is not prepared for such a contest. Her naval power in the Pacific is much less than that of Peru, and a council of war at Callao had decided upon attacking the Spanish vessels of war on the 30th of November. If attacked, Spain will undoubtedly fight; but there are symptoms at home of an abandonment of the aggressive policy. The ministry did not approve of the continued assaults upon San Domingo, and had resigned. If so small a power as San Domingo can practically assert its rights against the designs of Spain, united South America need not fear menacing hers against similar designs affecting their independence.—Phil Ledger.
