

NEW MINES.—Just at this time, reports of the discovery of new mines are coming thick and fast. Prominent are those of Cœur d'Alene. From Eagle Creek, near La Grande, reported discoveries of fabulous import, come to us. Granite Creek and Mormon Basin, are being prospected, and not a week passes but ledges of quartz, whose croppings are unmistakably rich, are discovered, and in a little time will be tested and found rich. John Day's river and forks, are sending further reports of new discoveries daily. Further off, South Boise is being prospected, and reports most encouraging reach us. The Upper Columbia sends news of rich discoveries lately made about Colville, and still higher up the river. The amount of prospecting this season is greater than any season heretofore, since our mining interests have been developed, and the extent of ground prospected and number engaged, will result in placing the resources and capabilities of the vast regions north and east of us before the world, and we look for something permanent and enduring to transpire.—Umatilla Advertiser.

More New Mines.—A report comes from the direction of Kootenai that new gold mines have been found on Elk river, a tributary of the Kootenai, which empties into the Kootenai a short distance this side of the British line. We learn from Messrs. Waldron and Drouillard, the Kootenai expressmen, that considerable confidence was felt in the reports at Fisherville, and that the mines were believed to be, as reported there, very rich. The mines are on American soil which fact gives great satisfaction to the miners about Fisherville who intend to go—the taxes and duties on goods taken into the British Columbia mines being so extremely high that unless they have very rich claims, they cannot pay the prices and make wages. Miners can better afford to work mines on this side of the line that yield one-half less gold than on the other, and if the Elk river mines prove to be as good as reported, there will be a general departure of the miners from Wild Horse Creek to "America." Hope so.—Walla Walla Statesman.

THE PLACERVILLE MURDERERS.—We learn by Sunday's stage that the examination of these cases was progressing until last Thursday, when it became evident that the crowd would soon relieve the officers from further duty in the case, and the prisoners were hustled away at an early hour on Friday morning, and confined in the jail at Idaho City. The prisoners were very anxious to waive further examination and get inside the jail. Thus the matter stands at present.—Idaho Statesman.

There is quite a number of adventurers on their way to the newly discovered mines near the Cœur d'Alene Mission. Thursday evening the steamer Web-foot arrived at our levee, and among her passengers were several on their way to test the truth of the discoveries. Lewiston is nearly depopulated by the rush to the new mines, and Walla Walla has furnished a large number of representatives to the same place. From the numbers who have gone, some reliable information may be looked for, as to the extent and richness of the new discoveries.—Umatilla Advertiser.

THE PLAINS BACK.—A company of emigrants having a train of six wagons, arrived in town yesterday on their way from Umatilla county, Oregon, across the plains back to America. The war over and peace restored, thousands will return to their old homes, and heretofore we shall see immigration and emigration, travel and traffic both ways, on the overland route each year.—Idaho Statesman.

NEGRO SUFFRAGE.—The San Francisco Flag boldly comes out in favor of the extension of the right of suffrage to negroes. It advocates a change in the Constitution of California, that will place colored men in the possession of the elective franchise, and make them equal before the law.

Without stopping to question the correctness of the Flag's proposition, we ask on what principle it is proposed to extend this law to Africans and leave the John Chinamen out in the cold? If the proposition be based on principle, then its application should be to all men, without respect to color or nativity.

FIRE AT COLLINS' WOOD YARD.—On Friday last fire was discovered in Collins' wood yard, twelve miles this side of the Cascades, which was not extinguished until nearly two thousand cords of wood was destroyed. Nothing is known with certainty as to the origin of the fire. Mr. Collins has the contract for supplying the O. S. N. Company's steamer with wood; and the loss is one he will feel severely.
