A DARING ROBBERY.—The boldest robbery we ever heard of occurred last night about nine o'clock at the store of Crawford, Stocum & Co. Mr. Redway, as was his habit, had made up his cash account and put his dust into the safe, and stood at the desk in his office making a memorandum of greenbacks that he had just placed in a wallet and left lying at his elbow on the desk. While entering a note of the amount in the cash-book some person entered the office through the back door of the store, snatched the wallet—containing about two thousand dollars in greenbacks and some notes—from the desk and escaped out of the store into the darkness. Mr. Redway had just time to get a glimpse of the man—enough to see that he had on a pair of goggles, and was otherwise disguised. Several persons were standing a short distance from the office door, but the operation was so adroitly and quickly performed that before any of them could realize what was done the rascal had made good his escape. An outside window had the curtain raised a little through which he no doubt made a reconnaissance that enabled him to make his grab at the right moment.—*Idaho Statesman.*

STAGES FOR CALIFORNIA.—Captain Mallan has already put the new line in successful operation, running his stages tri weekly. W. F. & Co. now forward messengers over this route, the first one having left this week. Security has been obtained by the proprietor from Gen. McDowell for the safety of the stages along the road. Ten companies of soldiers are now on their way to protect the route from Indian depredations. The stages connect at Chico with California Stage Company; at Susanville, with stages to Virginia; and at Puebla with stages to Humboldt. Passengers are ticketed through from Boise City to San Francisco or Virginia. Fare from Boise City to Virginia \$75; to Humboldt \$65; to Chico \$75; to Sacramento \$85; and San Francisco \$90. The stages leave Boise City regularly on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays. Passengers are allowed to lay over at every point on the road, and resume their journey at their own option. We understand the stages are running crowded with passengers, who express themselves as well satisfied with the trip. *Idaho Statesman.*
