RAGUSA OF THE DEEP.—Four hundred years ago there flourished a city on the shores of the Adriatic, numbering many thousand, filled the churches and abounding in wealth, but remarkable for the wickedness and cruelty of its people. They excelled the world in burning heretics and persecuting originators of new ideas. Suddenly an earthquake sunk nine-tenths of their city more than 100 feet below the level of the sea. The waters of the Adriatic closed over their spires, palaces and prison-houses, and nothing was left of Ragusa but a wretched scattering suburbs. Peasants, even to this day, have a marvelous legend. They say it went down so straight that scarcely a wall was broken or a steeple prostrated; that the wicked inhabitants had charmed lives and are still under the dominion of Neptune, following their old pursuits, all unconscious of the world above them. As the Dalmatian fisherman sails his shallop over the quiet sea at eventide, looking down into the still blue depths, he is startled by the hum of strange voices rising from the streets of this city of the old—strange voices shrieking, cursing, imploring in a dead language, but refused to be hushed even in death. In this upper world twelve generations have passed away, kingdoms and dynasties have risen and fallen, the bayonet has supplanted the spear and the battle ax, the cannon the battering ram, knowledge has triumphed over force, and the fires of bigotry are extinguished. Italy is free. But down in the magic streets of the submarine city, all the habits and customs of the middle ages are yet maintained.

INDIAN SUPERSTITION.—The Klamath News of September 9th says: "One day last week a squaw belonging at the mouth of Salmon was shot by an Indian from the Altaram ranch. The nephew of the Indian had died a few days before, and his relatives were positive that the cause of his disease was some internal, necromantic operation of the squaw in question. When on the hill above Mr. Sims' house, the aggrieved met the unfortunate 'witch,' and shot her with a rifle. Sims and White witnessed the affair from a distance. The murderer escaped, congratulating himself that he had rid his tribe in general, and his ranch in particular, of a dangerous enemy, whose supernatural powers were the dread of the Altaram branch of the Klamath nation. The Klamath Indians are very superstitious, and such occurrences as the one above related are by no means unfrequent. Our red neighbors are very ungracious, and the payment of the market value of the deceased lady will settle the matter.

ATTACHMENTS OF ANIMALS.—There were two Hanoverian horses which assisted in drawing the same gun during the whole Peninsular war, in the German Brigade of artillery. One of them met his death in an engagement; after which the survivor was picketed as usual, and his food was brought to him. He refused to eat, and kept constantly turning his head around to look for his companion, and sometimes calling him by a neigh. Every care was taken, and all means that could be thought of were adopted to make him eat, but without effect. Other horses surrounded him on all sides, but he paid no attention to them; his whole demeanor indicated the deepest sorrow, and he died from hunger, not having tasted a bit from the time his companion fell.

SOME of the owners of plantations in Texas are now preparing to work their estate by contracting with German families, who are to serve upon them, occupy the houses formerly occupied by the negroes, and pay four dollars an acre for the rent of the land.

THE AMENDE HONORABLE.—The Jockey Club (says *Galigane's Messenger*) has just lost one of its most amiable members, M. Alexandre Bouchet. The following anecdote is related of him: Perceiving one day, after a heavy fall of rain, a very well-dressed young woman standing at the edge of the side pavement of the Boulevard, and evidently much perplexed as to the best method of traversing the sea of mud before her, he gallantly advanced, took her up in his arms, and carried her across dry shod. The lady made no objection to the mode of transit, but, on being set down expressed her gratitude as follows: "Sir, you are an insolent fellow!" Thereupon, M. Bouchet immediately repaired the wrong by again transporting her, with the same precautions, to the very spot where he had first met her, and took his leave with a profound salutation.

Sir W. T. Wood, the British Vice Chancellor, has decided that the Confederate States constituted a government *de facto*, and that the United States, in again extending its jurisdiction over the country covered by the Confederate Government, succeeded to its assets and obligations.
