**GOLD MINING IN WALES.**—About two years ago a number of companies were started with a view of working the auriferous quartz deposits discovered in several localities in North Wales, and such was the confidence entertained at the time in the success of Welsh gold mining, that capital was obtained without difficulty from the over-credulous public. The temporary success of the Vigna and Clogan mines was the greatest inducement to enter into these speculations, and the warning that appeared from time to time in the *Times* had little effect upon the investing classes. Among the companies formed were the Cambrian, East Cambrian, Welsh Gold Mining, Castell Carn, Dorchan, Dolfrwynog, East Clogan, St. David, and many others, and fully one-half the number are by this time either in course of winding up, or unable to proceed, owing to having spent the whole of their capital, and those that are still working show hardly any prospect of success. The Vigna and Clogan mine, which formerly gave such promising indications, has not paid any dividends for three years, which proves that gold mining in the Principality is a speculation in the widest sense of the term. Quartz containing a certain per centage of gold has been discovered at all the mines, but the cost of reduction has been far above the yield of pure metal, and hence the unprofitable character of the speculations, and until the mechanical appliances for extracting the gold from the quartz are more perfect and less costly than at present, gold mining cannot be successfully carried on in Wales.—*London Times.*

**INTERESTING CHEMICAL FACTS.**—A platinum crucible is made and retained red hot over a large spirit lamp. Some sulphurous acid is poured into it. The acid, though at common temperature one of the most volatile of known bodies, possesses the singular property of remaining fixed in the red hot crucible, and not a drop of it evaporates; in fact it is not in contact with the crucible, but has an atmosphere of its own interposed. A few drops of water are now added to the sulphurous acid in the red-hot crucible. The diluted acid gets into immediate contact with the heated metal, instantly flashes off, and such is the rapidity and energy of the evaporation that the water remains behind and is frozen into a lump of ice in a hot crucible from which, seizing the moment before it again melts, it may be thrown out before the eyes of the astonished observer. This is indeed "a piece of natural magic," and as much like a miracle as any operation of the forces of nature could produce. It is certainly one of the most singularly beautiful experiments imaginable. It was devised by a French savant to illustrate the repellent power of heat radiating from bodies at a high temperature, and of the rapid abstraction of heat produced by evaporation.

**THE SEVEN OLD AND SEVEN NEW WONDERS OF THE WORLD.**—The Egyptian Pyramids, the Mausoleum of Mausolos, the Temple of Diana, the walls and hanging gardens of Babylon, the Colossus of Rhodes, the Statue of Jupiter at Athens, and the Pharos or light-house of Ptolemy Philadelphia, 500 feet high, have long been considered as the seven great mechanical wonders of the world. The seven modern wonders of the world are: the Steam Engine, the Printing Press, the Telescope, the Microscope, the Electric Telegraph, the Chemical Laboratory, and the Photograph. The superior utilitarian character of the moderns over the ancients, is most remarkably exemplified in the above enumeration of the chief efforts of the highest mechanical genius of the two classes separately considered.

Articles in the Southern papers render it apparent that while the rebel paroled soldiers, and the poor whites, generally, are running around loose at the South, the men of property are in great tribulation, and suffering intensely under the proviso excluding all possessing property valued at over 20,000 from the amnesty.
