### Atlantic News.

New York, October 31.—The Richmond correspondent of the Herald says that B. Fabian, charged with frauds in the New York Custom-house has been arrested there. It is alleged that he was connected with the recent unlawful shipment of alcohol.

Paymaster Binney has been offered the appointment of restoring to the Government certain funds and be honorably discharged, or take the chance of a trial.

The steamer City of Boston, from Liverpool, the 18th, via Queenstown, the 19th, arrived this afternoon. The Steamer United Kingdom, twenty-four days out from New York, for Glasgow, arrived at Rosthmillon with her machinery disabled.

Lord Palmerston is dead. He had been seriously ill for some days past from the effects of a cold. His symptoms had been very alarming, but he steadily improved. On the night of the 17th, however, a bulletin was issued to the effect that he had become worse since morning, and that it could not be disguised that he was seriously ill. Telegrams were constantly being sent to the Queen, at Balmoral. Lord Palmerston would have completed his 81st year on the 20th of October.

The Paris papers say the deaths from cholera in that city are averaging 200 per day.

### California News.

San Francisco, Nov. 1.—The Grand Jury yesterday dismissed the complaint against J. J. Ayres and P. B. Foster, proprietors of the Morning Call, and F. Mariott of the News Letter, for libel.

A paragraph recently passed the rounds of the press announcing that orders had been received at Mare Island to prepare the barracks for 700 marines. Subsequently the story was denied. We learn from Washington that the Navy Department several weeks ago sent to the Mare Island Navy Yard for plans and estimates for the erection of barracks to accommodate 700 sailors and marines. The monitor Camanche is still at Mare Island, nearly ready for service, and in condition to be placed in our harbor at six hours' notice, should there be occasion for it. Every few days the steam is raised upon her to test the workings of her engines and machinery, and to keep everything in proper condition. Target firing is also practiced occasionally to perfect the men in the proper management of the guns.

ROBBERY.—A man named Pomeroy was robbed of seventy ounces of gold, on the 3d inst., about two miles out from Umatilla. The Advertiser says that the robbery was perpetrated by a Mexican and an Indian. Pomeroy was on a wagon with his family and one or two others. He appears to have resisted, but the robbers overpowered him. Taking assistance with him, he returned to the spot where the robbery was committed, and near it was found a purse belonging to Pomeroy, and his revolver. The Mexican is from the Dalles, and is known.

GOLD IN A NEW PLACE.—A gentleman of this city, while eating a piece of beef kidney the other day, found two small pieces of gold imbedded in it. One of the pieces was about the bulk of five fair-sized grains of wheat, and the other as large as two. Each of the pieces contained a small amount of quartz. It is common to find small pieces of rock in the kidneys of oxen and cows, but this is the only case of gold being found in such a place. The animal probably took it up while drinking in shallow water, or maybe by licking the ground for salt or grass seed.
